Readers loved Sarah Armstrong, the feisty and vulnerable profiler in Kathryn Casey's first mystery, *Singularity*. She's back in this second book in the series with her hands full with two cases at once: A persistent and potentially lethal stalker pursues pop mega-star Cassidy Collins, and a high-energy Houston businesswoman is found dead in her house.

Though the businesswoman's death is being called a suicide, when Sarah is shown photographs of the scene, something seems off. It looks too perfect, almost staged, and Billie Cox apparently had every reason to live. The victim's sister is convinced Billie was murdered and urges Sarah to take a closer look. During her investigation, Sarah uncovers a multimillion-dollar scam and traces a trail of greed to Billie's murderer.

Meanwhile, teenage idol Cassidy receives threatening e-mails and text messages and hears creepy whispers over her headset at performances. Cassie's next performance is at a Houston rodeo, for which her handlers request extra security. Sarah once again teams up with FBI agent David Garrity, and together they plot to outwit and capture the stalker, but at the concert the unthinkable happens. . . .

Kathryn Casey spins a tight plot with memorable characters and great action scenes, while paying close attention to Sarah's struggles as a widow and mother, to create a multilayered, exciting, and satisfying read.

But even her protective teenaged daughter and her rancher mother know it's time for Sarah to go back to work. She immediately becomes involved in providing protection for a young singing star who's being stalked, but a grieving sister persuades her to look into a "suicide" that just might be murder.

Sarah Armstrong is recovering from the wounds she received in "Singularity." She is beginning to be anxious to be back at work as a Texas Ranger profiler. She agrees to come back part-time to work two cases: the suicide of Billie Cox, Houston oil woman and the stalking of Cassidy Collins, the new "IT" girl singer. Come to find out, Billie's suicide was actually a murder and Cassidy's stalker is getting closer and closer. Sarah's life is complicated by being a single mother. Her daughter's horse is getting ready to foal and develops a life-threatening bacterial infection. Sarah has to balance being there for Maggie and her horse, as well as the Cox family and Cassidy Collins. I enjoy this series because of its focus on Sarah's family life as well as her Ranger life. It is a good balancing act, well orchestrated.

I found this highly entertaining. Can I pinpoint one thing that made it that way for me? No, it was a combination of things like author's writing style, snappy dialogue, and I just plain like the main character. Sarah Armstrong is a Texas Ranger, a profiler, a mom, a daughter, and a rancher, all rolled into one. She lives on the ranch with her mother and daughter, Maggie. Sarah's husband, Bill, was killed in a car accident.

Sarah is currently working on a couple of cases. Pop mega-star, teenager, Cassie Collins, has a stalker whose threats keep escalating. When he somehow finds a way to talk to her through her headset, onstage, Cassie is freaked out to the point she demands Sarah be the one to find him and stop him. Sarah figures the best thing, for now, is to hide Cassie away on her ranch where no one will look for her, including her own manager and crew. Cassie, being a typical cocky, bratty, little teenager balks at the idea - until Sarah turns and walks away. Cassie's fear overpowering all other emotions, makes it easy to give in to Sarah's demands. It actually turns out to be a good thing for all involved.

While Cassie is well guarded at the ranch, Sarah is free to work her other case as well. Billie Cox, an oil company exec and wealthy Texas businesswoman, is found dead in what appears to be a suicide. Sarah isn't buying it. The crime scene is too neatly staged. The gun isn't where it should be if Billie pulled the trigger and the point of entry doesn't jive, again if Billie pulled the trigger. Now Sarah has to find out who murdered her and why.

Like I said, I really enjoyed this. I didn't want to put it down and look forward to reading more of this author's work.
