This was predictable but fun.

This is your usual run of the mill shifter story, but if you like the occasional easy to read shifter series (like me) then this is a good one.

There are the good guys, the bad guys, the omega who is pregnant (yay for mpreg) and the Alpha mate who rescues the pregnant omega from the bad guys.

What appeals to me in these badly written stories about shifters and mpreg is that the emotion is often over the top. Everyone is either suffering or happy happy. And I like that. It's so extreme that I find myself laughing all the time.

That's why this series is not good bad, just bad. The story lines are not even that terrible, just the writing.

Again, I like the general air of caring about each other that this author usually manages to conjure for her protagonists.

In this one, though, the pregnancy aspect seemed a little superfluous or remote, and the fact that omegas in this series are basically women came out even stronger than in the previous book. Larson especially might just as well have been a woman. I don't see any real difference.

Allow me to go off on this tangent for a moment.

When I say the omegas are really females, then I am referring to the idea of females further back in history. Seventy years ago, or two-hundred, possibly more. Something along those lines. Omega wolves have hardly any rights, they are supposed to see to domestic chores and birth and raise the kids. Their lives are pretty much defined through the man who claims them.

And that might be one reason for the influx of male pregnancy stories. With today's sensibilities I imagine that a lot of readers would be upset to see women subjugated wholesale like that, and to watch them accept that fate without striving for equality, for their basic rights. (And it's funny because that sort of imbalance used to be justified biologically as well – just as it is for omega wolves here, I presume.) Somehow having men in that kind of situation seems to disarm that knee-jerk outrage to an extent. (Even though it really shouldn't.)

I am not up to date with current romance heroines but when I was still reading hetero romance I'd noticed the trend had gone far away from helpless and instead deeply into kickass and self-sufficient. (Maybe not emotionally, but that's another matter entirely.)

Er, okay, back to the book.

The writing was okay, although not brilliant. I noticed a few recognizable phrases, snippets of dialogue being reused from book one or other points in this volume. That felt a little awkward.

Strangely, of all the series by this author that I've read thus far, this one seems to have the least depressing background. (Slaves and suppressed omegas notwithstanding.)

The pack we've been following thus far seems fairly well off money-wise, and that was even reinforced now. (view spoiler) And society seems relatively regulated, allowing for modern life and its conveniences to exist alongside the paranormal – which is nice now that people actually can afford it.

Maybe these things will be different in other volumes. I fully expect some dark cloud of oppression to descend. I shall keep my umbrella ready. Just in case.
