


Hologram: A Haunting

as the realtor walks her through the 1910 grand old Springfield St. house in Hammond, Indiana. Kurt, Meg's reluctant husband, will have to commute on weekends from the windy city until his condo sells. And so it is agreed, they buy the house. It's not long before Meg experiences paranormal activity. Tapping, objects moved and the cat is spooked. Someone is playing a piano!

Still Meg "belongs" there. Unwilling to separate herself from her new home, she concludes to leave Kurt out of the loop on this one. Instead Meg reveals all to her BFF Wennoah. After the hairs on Wennoah's neck settle down, she is insistent Meg tell Kurt. When Meg finally reveals to Kurt that they do indeed have "room mates of the most unusual kind. Kurt promptly urges Meg to book a session with a psychiatrist. Gee thanks honey. Reluctantly she complies. The good doctor provides valuable insight by explaining a Hologram. The difference between a spirit and a ghost. But more importantly, Meg is putting herself and her unborn child in danger. The ghost wants something. When Kurt has his own frightening encounter and still can not convince Meg it's time to go, he leaves her behind with a For Sale sign newly planted on the front lawn.

The author skillfully lured me deeper into the story through Meg's library research. Meg wants to discover what happened there and to set it right.

Meg and her husband Kurt move into a 1910 home in Hammond, Indiana. Meg feels connected to the house, and Kurt cedes to his wife's request - they're having a baby, after all. Once the house had a stable, but it burned down in 1911 - along with a boy named Claude.

Now Meg (and eventually Kurt) sense the presence of a ghost - but is it Claude, his mother Alicia, or both? And why are they haunting the place?

I was irritated at Meg sometimes for being so secretive and for lying, and also for NOT WAITING for her best friend Wenonah to arrive before completely opening to the spirits.

The idea of life being a "hologram" where there are layers of time that some are more sensitive to. It's a unique and cool theory.

I was hoping for something a lot better than this. The writing is very basic with a "large word" thrown in just to make it seem more intelligent. The whole mystery of the haunting is already explained in the prologue, ruining any chance for the discovery to mean anything. Characters are bland or outright annoying, as we have the standard woman needs to have a baby, the husband acting angry and remote at times, and the friend that doesn't care for the husband and finds out that he might not be faithful to her friend. To top it off, the whole reason for the title is to throw in a belief in the Matrix theory that causes the hauntings in the first place. I was mostly hoping for some sort of "Scooby Doo" kind of haunting, where someone is using technology in order to drive a person crazy or run them out of town.
