First the bad news - it appears to be a self-published book, and it has the problems of a self-published book - misspelled words, run-together sentences, paragraphs broken when they should not be, places where there were obviously meant to be section breaks and were not. The good news - it was a fun and exciting mystery, and I am glad I read it. It was not deep, but exciting. I was sincerely touched by how much the female protagonist loved her husband, who had died. The author is good at descriptive writing - almost too good. I got a little tired of hearing how beautiful the female protagonist is - I wanted to shout, "I get it! I get it! She's a stone-cold Fox." P.M. Richter's 'Deadly Fun' turned out to be deadly fun for this reader. This straight ahead spy novel (with a tiny dabble of romance) takes place on the high seas and has a bit of a detective noir feel to it, though I can't put my finger on exactly why it has that feel, but that should not be thought of as a bad thing.

The story brings two spies, Lo and Dan, aboard a Caribbean cruise ship where they are given the assignment to gather information from members of a crime family who are vacationing aboard the ship. Spying and information gathering ensues and we find out that Lo has ties to the crime family she didn't realize existed.

The author writes the psychology of her characters from her own knowledgeable background and seems to have done her research when it comes to intelligence gathering, which makes the story line believable.

When I first began reading this novel I wondered how the author would manage the location restrictions inherent to a cruise ship, but Richter manages to handle the restrictions well and takes advantage of just about every location on shipboard including the ship's ladies rooms. She also takes the reader on land to experience exotic ports of call, which was a nice change of pace.

Richter's story is witty, well put together and well written. If I had one complaint it might be that there seemed to me to be a wee too much dialogue. But that is my personal opinion and should not keep a reader from enjoying this lively and fun romp over the high seas.

I enjoyed this book for several reasons. It's a fast, light, read that is perfect for travel, vacation, or a bubble bath. Deadly Fun would also make a pretty enjoyable TV movie.

Why I liked DEADLY FUN:

The good guys have heart. I understood them. I 'got' their back stories and bought into them. The good guys are operatives for an investigative agency associated with the FBI. They are onboard an expensive cruise looking to prove a mob family's criminal activity. It so happens that this mob family may have `history' with one of the good guys. Revenge becomes a conflict.

The bad guys may have been a tad bit stereotyped, but the story isn't about them anyway. The bad guys serve as catalysts for the protagonists to interact and eventually fall in love. (This may be a tiny spoiler for some, but please don't pretend you are shocked!) The bad guys were secondary characters who didn't need too much depth. Sonya is one scary bitch with a black heart underneath her muscled chest. Her situation wasn't entirely a surprise to me, but it was done well. Her brothers, Sal and Steven are throwbacks to an era of brutish caveman mentality. Yes, they are brutes, but they are not unbelievable.

Except, there is one bad guy, a Russian, who was interesting. He wasn't presented until the last third (?) of the book. He was 'complicated', with motivations and a sense of criminal honor all his own.

I'm a sucker for friendships and loyalty. Richter excels here, too. All her books focus on real relationships based on respect, trust, friendship, and/or love. Lo develops a friendship with Gwen, an innocent victim of the bad guys. Gwen, may be a sweet goody-2-shoes, but she's not stupid and has good wisdom for Lo. There's an interesting and sweet sub-plot involving a well-loved US Senator and his wife and some subtle commentary about today's political situation.

Lo and Lance (the good guy characters' real names, not the names of the fake married couple they pretend to be on the cruise ship. Their cover names are Dan and Linda) dance around respect, sexual attraction, grief, divorce, revenge, commitment to the job, and fun, if deadly shipboard activities.

What I didn't like:

The lead character names! Lolita and Lancelot. but maybe that's me. i know what it's it's like not to to have a cool name!
