


Naked Brain

Surprise in the mail yesterday: a signed copy of Naked Brain from author Michael Allen Hunt via Goodreads.com First Readers Program, with the inscription which advised that "all truth begins with an open mind."

Somehow being thus prepared, and reading that the plot includes a black hole appearing at the Pentagon, helped me enjoy a book that did not fit the mold of what I expected.

Granted that I may give extra points to a story based in Ohio, but that really is not what makes me like this book. The complex but not convoluted story line involving the secrets of life and relationship of God to man worked for me and I also liked that the seemingly simple small town hero turns out to be very cerebral and many of the author's characters are surprising and multidimensional.

As it turns out the Pacific Northwest Booksellers Assn. who nominated this as book of the year did know something of which they speak. I am not saying that some scenes of conflict, imprisonment and harshness were not unpleasant, but I found Naked Brain to be a well written, meticulously plotted and thought provoking page turner.

Yes this book asks you to suspend disbelief for the duration, but the payoff is worth it; rating a good four stars - and teetering on a fifth simply for the courage to write about spirituality in this genre.

The author signed this book for me and included a quote "All truth begins with an open mind." I wholeheartedly agree with this quote. I tried to read this with an open mind or rather a "naked brain." Unfortunately I couldn't read it with no brain at all.

I read a lot of sci-fi, fantasy, and paranormal books and usually have no problem suspending belief, but this book just asks too much. Hunt mixes science and religion which I have no problem with, but he also reinvents all of science in nonsensical detail. He changes Special Relativity, General Relativity, time, thermodynamics, the Standard model, cosmology, geology, and genetics. It made the science junkie in me cringe, but also the explanation did not coincide with itself. It is both externally inconstant (FYI the tilt of the Earth determines neither the geographical nor magnetic poles) and also internally inconsistent (i.e. there is friction in outer space but not at the center of the Earth). I would have been more content with an explanation like "this is how God wants it " or "it's magic. "But if I'm going to take the time and effort to read all this it should at least be logical and sensible. This wasn't my only problem with the book. I also didn't care for the story once it turned into something reminiscent of a bad disaster movie.

I know this sounds all negative, but this book does have some good points. The theme about the human race having the ability to accidentally end life as we know it if we are not careful is an important one. The idea of convergent evolution on a galactic scale is fascinating.

The author's writing style is smooth and his detailed descriptions are vivid. When Duke was in the penthouse I really felt it.

The bad guy is really really evil and I love me a good villain.

For those who like this sort of thing there is plenty of action, including an escape from a literal Hell on Earth. I was tickled when I opened to page one chapter 63 and watched the chapters count down..._

The Naked Brain is a fast paced, action-packed, science-fiction novel that once you start you will find difficult to put down. The reader is quickly pulled into the story and is then hurtled through the plot twists and turns towards earth's pending destruction and mankind's likely demise.

The premise is an interesting twist on the incongruity between science and religion. Some of the concepts defy science as we know it but that is ultimately the point of science fiction and the author does a refreshingly good job of stretching known realities into inconceivable possibilities; of making fiction out of science.

There is not a lot of in-depth development of characters, yet it not only works with the story but masterfully helps to continually wind up the intensity to the climatic conclusion. You learn enough of the characters along the way to understand them, love some, hate some, and empathize with some, and the author avoids the hundreds of filler pages you often find in books helping you to get to know the characters a little better, yet irrelevantly so.

This book is likely to appeal to a broad section of readers and makes for a fast paced and exciting read. I can easily understand how this was nominated for Pacific Northwest Booksellers Association Book of the Year and I anxiously await his next novel.

I received Naked Brain through a Goodreads giveaway and was thoroughly interested by the general premise. I began reading with an open mind per request of the author and found enough in the novel to keep

me interested throughout.

A major shortcoming of the novel was the poor character development. As we learned more about each character, I found that the information was either irrelevant, made me dislike the character even more, or found the character to be just a stereotypical cardboard cut out. This is more than true with the main character, Duke Nolan. Another weak point of the novel was the too numerous to count, cringe-worthy one liners that are riddled throughout. I found myself rolling my eyes quite a bit and wanting to close the book on more than one occasion because of them.

There were some strong points as well. When Hunt was not trying to be funny or giving us unnecessary details, the story flowed at a good pace making this a quick read while touching on a few deep level concepts. Trying to create a world where science, God, evolution, aliens, and human relationships mesh together in a way that makes sense is a difficult task and Hunt makes a valid attempt.

Overall, Naked Brain had the potential but fell short of the epic that it wanted to be. If the characters were developed better, the irrelevant and unnecessary details were less frequent, and if the major concepts were flushed out more thoroughly in the universe that Hunt creates, then Naked Brain would have been a worthwhile read. As it stands though, this one was just not for me.
