First of all let me state I won this book on Amazon from a sweepstakes I entered on Goodreads and am offering a voluntary and unbiased review of what I read.

I would rate *The Poor Relation* by Margaret Bennett a very decent 3 1/2 to 4 stars read. She is an author I was not familiar with and her book would be classified as a clean Regency period romance. There is some mildly passionate kissing and embracing between the H and h but no sexual relations if this makes a difference to the readers.

Our heroine, sweet and caring Lady Sophia Milbanke, is an on the shelf spinster who lives with and is devoted to her elderly aunt who likes to imbibe frequently whether at home or at society functions. Oliver, Viscount Camden, our hero, is a well-known rake in society but also happens to work as a spy for the crown at home and sometimes abroad.

I received a copy of the ebook edition of this in a Goodreads giveaway. It was an enjoyable quick read. However, there were a frustrating number of editing errors (perhaps only in the ebook?) and also issues with historical accuracy and the use of period idiom that were distracting. As the commitment to minimal sensuality limited the nature of the main characters' interactions, an espionage subplot was used to create a lot of the situations that threw the characters together. However, after involving the reader in a good deal of the details of that subplot along the way, that whole storyline is wrapped up "off stage" leaving the reader wondering. I enjoyed the subplot and the need for it to flesh out the book and give the main characters some reason to be involved with each other, which otherwise would not exist. However, once the author felt their romance to be established, that plot was tossed aside, which leaves the reader questioning whether so much detail on a plot to be abandoned was needed. However, the supporting characters are charming and overall the book is a fun read.

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
