Of the two, I found Turi's back and forth displayed attitude towards his mate the most irritating until he decided he wasn't going to just give up on his mate.

The bdsm elements felt forced to me in the sex scenes. Maybe not enough connection with the MCs as a reader or in the story to take an innocent and introduce the rougher side of sex as his first time.

Last on my list... Liked cousin Kiki (he should get a story!) but the fight scene at the end wasn't really exciting. There was no drag out and suspense build up for me and frankly displayed Carmine in a wimpyish and somewhat negative way..we are talking about his *mate* being taken and he's vacillating between harming anyone in his way or going gung ho come hell or high water to get his mate back.

All in all... I liked (oked) it.. would not be considered a favorite but wasn't a complete wash for me.

Writing seems very amateur compared to other books of hers, not sure what happened, but it is.

The characters annoyed me. They (mostly Turi) were idiots.

Carmine nearly runs over Turi, Turi tries to get away (as he's on the run). Uses his stranger/rape whistle that he keeps around his (Turi) wrist when Carmine moves closer to him, touches him in a *friendly* way and looks at him. Saying things like, *don't get any closer, I have a whistle and know how to use it*. Turi eventually gets in Carmine's car and basically implies Carmine (who he knows is his mate) is a rapist, murderer and pervert. He asks if he's going to dump his body somewhere, etc. Carmine is frustrated (who wouldn't be!) and because of seeing his father waste away after he lost his mate, he's determined not to have that happen to him. Carmine doesn't want to claim Turi and Turi tells Carmine more than once that he doesn't need the complication of a mate. So they *both* didn't want to mate each other at the time, but Turi was far more

adamant with it. They go to the Lakeland's, but then end up at Carmine's house. Again, Turi expresses his suspicion that Carmine will murder him and dump the body in the woods, he's hesitant to get in the vehicle. I mean, come on. Carmine is a detective and his mate and he gave NO reason for Turi's suspicions! This is all roughly 30 pages in! I was so annoyed with Turi that I nearly DNF this book.

It was explained to us that as a child, Turi was lured by a pervert with a car, but was saved before anything happened. His cousin gave him a whistle. It seems Turi has never grown out of that experience, because it's been YEARS and he's still wearing the whistle and blowing it when a man so much as looks or touches him, whether it's a friendly touch or not. Pretty ridiculous! There's even mention of the whistle during their sex scene. Ugh. I get being lured into a car is a scary and serious thing, but for the purposes of the story (as it's fiction, not RL!), for him to keep up with the whistle as an adult, years later didn't come off as funny or cute, but childish and bizarre.

So, after Turi made it clear that if Carmine looked, touched, or tried to be intimate with him, he'd blow his little whistle WHY is Turi confused and hurt that Carmine doesn't seem to want him? Is Turi an idiot? (YES!) In the car, Carmine tried to comfort him by patting him on the leg in a very non-sexual manner and Turi blew his whistle. So, why would Carmine try to kiss him or hell, even get close to him? But Turi is all poor-me my mate is denying me WHHHHYYYYYYYYYY? I rolled my eyes. A lot.

The rest, when they decide to get together wasn't that much better. It also felt like the book wanted to include D/s, but couldn't be bothered to actually write it in the book.

And the idea that fae are incestuous is just gross. Turns out Turi's uncle isn't his uncle (as Turi isn't his father's son), but still.

This is book # 11 in the Brac Village series (a spinoff from the Brac Pack). This gives us Det. Carmine Bianchi, a detective in Brac Village P.D. and black bear shifter who almost hits a man with his car. This man turns out to be Turi, a fae who's on the run from his father who is trying to force him to mate his uncle. Yes, that is gross, but that's what the Wood Elves do. They practice inbreeding which is the reason they're dying out. But I digress. Carmine does not want a mate and fights it every step of the way. His mother died when he was younger and his father's life fell apart because of it. Carmine is afraid to love because he doesn't want to end up like his dad: living a half life because he lost his mate. Turi does not want a mate because his life is a mess: his own father is trying to force him to mate his own uncle which adds an ick factor to the storyline. Those darn wood elves...oh well. Carmine spends time with Turi while trying to convince himself that he was doing it to protect the guy from his crazy inbreeding practicing father. Carmine of course falls in love with his mate and they live happily ever after in peace and harmony. For now at least. Hey, they live in Brac Village, a paranormal community. There is no such thing as peace and harmony when you have a wealthy human vampire hunter out to expose and destroy the paranormal residents of that community and the world. Of course, it's not a Lynn Hagen book if a few surprises aren't pulled out of the box. Turi's paternity and the revelation of who his father is was something that I did not see coming. And of course, Maverick Brac, the alpha was privy to that information. As always, this is not a standalone book. It's part of a series that must be read in sequential order as the characters often cross over from various books from her other series.
