Hang onto your hats! There's lots of surprises in this latest John Jordan mystery. Michael Lister has a way of making you feel that you are right there while the story is happening. This time it's the northern Florida swamps and I'm glad I could experience it from the book and not in person. I thoroughly enjoyed the way the characters from several of Michael's different series were so deftly melded into the story - nothing forced at all. Wait to you meet some of the interesting characters from the local area - Harry Felty and Carson Peak are just two of them. I did not want to set this book down, so I went to work a bit blurry eyed the next day. Several reviews I have read mention that they feel that Blood Shot is too repetitious of Double Exposure, but I have to disagree. Having recently read Double Exposure, I felt that I was given a new perspective of what happened to Remington when I got sections of Double Exposure and then saw how John and others were trying to piece together in the present what had happened earlier. It would not be the same if you were only reading what was happening to John in the present. I can hardly wait until the next in the series comes out.

While waiting for this most recent John Jordan story to come out, I decided to try another of Michael Lister's books "Double Exposure". It was not what I expected. I was disappointed.

Then I was lured by "Blood Shot". Imagine my surprise when the first chapter was directly from "Double Exposure". I thought it might be a computer glitch. I moved to the second chapter and there was John. I then realized Michael Lister had gotten me again. It was off to the races again.

This book is unique in the way it tells its story. We swing back and forth between the past and present as John and his cohorts try to solve what really happened as told in "Double Exposure". Reggie Summers and Merrick McKnight (from still another series) swim in and around the story, adding to the "Then and Now" form of the book. I have read these books but I think enough background is in the current novel that a first-time reader would not be left in the dark.

John Jordan's character is primarily an investigator but we get glimpses into his soul. What I like most about him is that he is not perfect. He shows his humanity and I recognize myself in that.

Michael Lister has outdone himself in the current story. I went back after finishing and found that all the clues needed to solve the puzzle were strewn throughout the book. The author is adept in sneaking in a few weed seeds in the flower garden which grow to take over the story.

Once again this is a book with a mystery to solve. This is done with a subtle hook at the end to let the reader know this is not truly "The End". Michael Lister has written a book he can take pride in. I look forward to John Jordan soon.

I received an e-copy of this book in return for an honest review.

I am a big fan of Michael Lister's John Jordan series and highly recommend them all. This book is a sequel to the book *Double Exposure*, which is not in the John Jordan series. If you have read *Double Exposure*, you will have already read about 1/3 of this book since whole chapters are repeated here. The pieces fit together naturally as you switch back and forth between what happened in *Double Exposure* and how it ties in with the investigation in *Blood Shot* as John and his friends try to solve a murder and answer questions raised in *Double Exposure*. It is very fast paced and kept me so engaged that I finished it in just one day. I really enjoyed this book, and in particular how Lister fit *Double Exposure* into the larger story. I had only recently read *Double Exposure* when I received *Blood Shot*, but you do not need to read *Double Exposure* to understand and enjoy *Blood Shot*.

This book is a sequel to the John Jordan series only to the extent that it fits in Jordan's time-line after the prior John Jordan book, but it does not offer much advancement with regard to the issues and questions left hanging at the end of the last John Jordan book. If I have a complaint it is that I want more answers NOW! I hope Lister won't keep us waiting too long for the next installment.
