If you liked "Epicenter", you'll probably like 'Inside the Revolution'. Rosenberg digs deeper, and explains in detail the historical and personal background of how the primary 'groups' have come to believe, in what they believe. 509 pages have never flown by faster. Grouped into three main groups, "Radicals", Reformers" and the 'Revivalists', Rosenberg has interviewed numerous people for their 'first hand' perspective in their own words.

This is a very fair and informative book on the complex nature of modern Islam and its implications for the world's future. The book is divided into three sections covering "Radical" terrorists, moderate "Reformers," and "Revivalists" converting to Christianity. Joel Rosenberg has a conservative right-wing perspective that strengthens the book in some places while weakening it in others, but the book's greatest value is the vast content derived from direct, personal correspondence with people all over the world - Muslims, Christians, US government figures, Middle Eastern leaders, and more.

The "Radicals" section focuses on the history of Iran since the 1979 revolution and the ensuing effects on terrorist activity. There is a lot of really useful information here for anyone who wants to have a better understanding and context for current events involving Iran. That said, while I agree with Rosenberg that many dangerously underestimate the risks of Islamic terrorism, I think his bias may have overestimated the risk, which I think is borne out by the hindsight of the near decade since the book's publication (Iran was apparently *not* 1-2 years away from a nuclear bomb, and the radical Ahmadinejad is no longer in power. In general I think Rosenberg's missed expectations or interpretations may have been affected by placing too much emphasis on people's *spoken words*, including some admittedly concerning poll results, rather than people's *revealed preferences* through their *actions*, perhaps combined with potential nuances lost between languages and cultures.) Nevertheless, it's a solid section and I learned a lot.

The "Reformers" section addresses not merely "moderate" Muslims as a general group - which Rosenberg says don't get nearly enough attention or respect - but specifically focuses on Muslim government leaders across the Middle East and Africa, and their inspiring pro-active efforts to stamp out radical ideology and promote democratic freedoms in their countries. The king of Morocco is one such hero, but the star figure is Iraq's first president Talabani, an experienced Kurdish Muslim seeking to unite his country's divided groups against terrorism while building a relationship with Israel. This was the best information I've ever read on moderate Islam from any perspective, and it not only taught me a lot but made me very excited about the future political prospects for numerous Islamic countries. The author's political bias shows through here with his unequivocal defense of the Iraq war, and US military interventions more generally, but he made a very compelling case for the positive outcomes of such American partnerships with Middle Eastern moderates. I don't know if this information is so unfamiliar because the right doesn't like to praise moderate Muslims and the left doesn't like to praise Bush's military adventures, but this section significantly impacted my views on the subject.

The final "Revivalists" section covers the accelerating growth of Christianity in Muslim countries. It talks about the supernatural dreams and visions that are well-known to anyone remotely familiar with this subject, and the different strategies and emphases of converted Muslim evangelists across the Middle East. The book's earlier background about the effects of the Iranian Revolution helped me understand how the widespread disillusion among the largely nominal Muslim Iranian citizenry has created a wide-open door for the power of the Gospel, and, in contrast to some of the more fiery figures on the right, Rosenberg uses this section to highlight the crucial Christian themes of "loving your neighbor" and "loving your enemies." The section's primary weakness comes from trying to find too specific of connections to Biblical eschatology in current events, as the hindsight of a decade bears out. Overall, however, the section confirmed my existing optimism for the *spiritual* future of the Middle East.

With hundreds of pages packed full of information, this book is not a short read - but it's written at a very accessible level that will keep you coming back until you finish. If you're interested in a solid book from a Christian conservative perspective that will greatly improve your understanding of Islam in today's world, I highly recommend it.

In this book, Joel Rosenberg (himself a Messianic Jew), is able to interpret the modern day conflicts in the Middle East (which he calls the "epicenter") in light of Biblical prophecy and make a compelling case that God is up to something HUGE in these "latter days". He is NOT some radical nut case ... he intellectually reviews the history of the region and its leaders, what they are saying they believe in, and he reviews what they are declaring their intentions to be. In the book, Rosenberg breaks down the groups of people into three categories: The Radicals (terrorist jihadist types), The Reformers (moderate Muslim leaders who desire peace in their region and hold to a form of Islam that is inclusive of other religions as well as open to democratic reforms), and The Revivalists (Muslim background believers in Jesus Christ as well as nominal Christians-turned "devoutly Christian" believers in the Middle East).

The first part of the book is devoted to making a clear case that Radical Muslim adherents are intentionally planning to annhilate and take over the West ... These people are openly stating their intentions for all the world to hear and they are doing everything they can to make it happen. Rosenberg documents this carefully. In the section on the Reformers, Rosenberg talks about the Reformers of the Middle east like the King of Morocco and the king of Jordan. Most compelling was his interview with leaders of Afghanistan and Iraq who are courageously attempting to lead their countries out of "war" mode and into a free democracy ... yes, a taylor made for the Middle East "democracy", but nevertheless, a country more open and free and representative of all faiths and peoples.

And the last part of his book, details the amazing revival taking place inside some of the most radical Islamic countries ... There is an explosion of conversions to Christianity taking place inside places like Sudan and Iran and Iraq and Afghanistan ... Rosenberg documents the amazing stories of Muslims who found the true God through encounters with the Living Christ in dreams and visions and miraculous healings ... These things are so real and point to the wonderful fact that no matter how the precarious political balance of power

turns out, God is still at work and will be found by those who truly are searching for lasting Peace. Rosenberg's book is so compelling and current. What makes it even more amazing is that God is using a JEW to reach out to Muslims in the Middle East with a message of Hope and Peace.

This book begins with quotes and discussions with recently retired U.S. Army General Jerry Boykin. I thought that name was familiar, and wondered if he was the same U.S. General who had been regularly appearing at evangelical revivals preaching that the US was in a holy war as a "Christian nation" battling "Satan". It is / was, so I initially wondered if the book would be "Born-again" Christian prostelitizing by Rosenberg, or a thorough review of the forces at play in the Middle East. After being fooled during the early part of the book when Rosenberg does spend some time discussing the forces of Jihad in the Middle East, in short order the more prevalent message of the book becomes clear. I can save you some time and just tell you that rather than read the book, just log onto his Joshua Fund website and make your financial donation now. Rosenberg is the founder and President of The Joshua Fund, a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit charity that seeks to "Bless Israel and her neighbors in the name of Jesus, according to Genesis 12:1-3", and that's the message of the book. His transitioning to a Christian-evangelical message with its Biblical prophesy made me feel I was being preached to, or was taking a bible study class. If that's what you're interested in, then you'll enjoy the book. If you're more interested in explainations of the turmoil in the Middle east based more on political, economic or societal insights, then you might be interested in a more secular book.

Eh, this was OK. Although a Christian myself, it seems to me that most Christians are a little too comfortable

and conditioned to "good news" to take world affairs or Islam seriously. They just rely on the works of "other Christians" too much for fear of being "distracted" by "worldly opinions."

Of course, pursuit of "worldly knowledge" should never override a Christian's pursuit of God, but people take that to extremes because they don't like hearing about the brutal realities of this fallen world. - 1. It's politically and religiously motivated work. 40% Political and 60% religious.
- 2. It undoubtedly campaigns Christian mission. As a Muslim reader, I'm 100% unconvinced about its narrative on Christianity. My religion is the ultimate truth as what the author's think on his religion. There's no wrong with my religion. There's wrong with the interpretation of the Qur'an but not with my RELIGION. NEVER.
- 3. The book is clearly BIASED. HE divided his work in 3 parts; the RADICALS, the REFORMERS, the REVIVALISTS. He defined RADICALS as those who have extreme ideas like that of Osama bin Laden and his followera, Ayatullah Khomieni and his followers. He even categorized religious Muslims as radical ones. REFORMERS for him are those leaders that SECULAR and PRO-DEMOCRACY or PRO-WEST. Lastly, REVIVALIST are the ones reviving the mission of Christianity. Inside the Revolution: How the Followers of Jihad, Jefferson & Jesus Are Battling to Dominate the Middle East and Transform the World by Joel C. Rosenberg has the breathless tone of missionary fervor throughout, although the first two thirds of the book are largely historical. Rosenberg frequently quotes his many interviewees directly, lengthening his account of 30 years of terrorism. He stresses the danger inherent in Iran's nuclear ambitions, detailing Ahmadinejad's threats in terms of Islamic eschatology, but trumps it all in the end with Christian Apocalypticism. He appreciates the good will of the Sufis he has met, but still insists the only way to a personal relationship with God is through Jesus. Meanwhile, he reports millions of Muslims are converting to Christianity; these are, in his system, the "MBBs," Muslim Background Believers, and they are to be aided by his "Joshua Fund," to which our contributions are welcome. Not my cup of tea, of course, but also not well-written.
