


# It Had To Be You

Though Lela and Beck are attracted to each other, they resist it. When both their children show symptoms of PTSD, common in kids of sufferers, a lasting relationship between Lela and Beck seems doomed. But fate has other things in mind for them, for their children and for two veterans of war whose experiences are also featured in the book. With the backdrop of a modern fire department and exciting fire scenes, this highly charged emotional drama will bring tears to the readers' eyes as everybody struggles through this untenable situation.

I'm mad at myself right now because I never mark a book DNF once I've gotten this far in a story. It's almost like getting tackled at the one yard line to give up with only 57 minutes (according to my kindle) left in the book but once I reach my bullshit threshold, it can't be helped.

I became a huge fan of the Hidden Cove Firefighters series a few years ago and over the past two weeks I have been re-reading the series to get familiar with the characters in order to finish the three books left in the series I have put off until now. The setup is as follows, Beckett Sloan is a former Army Captain who served time in Iraq and upon returning from the war suffers from PTSD attacks. His are so bad they incapacitate him and take him out of the realm of reality and back to the trauma associated with his syndrome. He's lost his wife and his son is estranged due to his illness but he's managed to pick himself up and become a firefighter in Hidden Cove. Lela Allen is an ex-army trauma nurse with an ex husband who suffers from PTSD and a son who has witnessed his father's brutal flashbacks which has left the little boy skittish of men. Beckett and Lela form a bond during a PTSD trauma group meeting which slowly develops into something deeper and the two can't stay away from each other or fight the feelings building between them. Lala doesn't want to subject her son to another man with PTSD symptoms so they agree tostay away from each other but when their sons become close friends it's a challenge to keep their promise.

This isn't an easy story, there's a lot of moving pieces and I knew to some extent what I was in for when I started but here's where I was pushed to put the book down indefinitely. So Beckett and Lela grow close the more time they spend together and of course they share a bond with the PTSD thing and that their kids are friends. It's so painful to ignore what their feeling that they give themselves 2 days to act on their feelings and then they promise to stay away to do what's best for Lela's son. For two days they make love and profess their deep love and have some amazing moments that had me hopeful they could make this work. They both start dating other people in an effort to try and move on but I was still hopeful that they would wake up and try to work around the issues plaguing them. When a tragedy occurs that affects Lela and her son it throws the story into a tailspin of melodramatic proportions. Not even three weeks after they've professed their love to each other they start screwing other people. WHAT THE F\*\*\* IS THAT???!!! I mean, I get human

emotion and how hurtful it is to not be with the person you're in love with but the reasoning behind why they were kept apart was just ludicrous.

#1) Lela doesn't want to subject her son to another man who has PTSD, I get that. What I don't get is why the hell she didn't get her son some damn HELP so he could get better with his trust issues with men. There's another thing, he has issues trusting men but he seems to get along with her new fuck buddy doctor? Which is it Shay? He doesn't like all men or just Beck? Honestly it felt like a cop out to keep the couple apart.

#2) The main focus of the entire series has centered on a particular fire department psychiatrist (Jack Harrison) who helps the firefighters and their families cope with painful events that affect their mental health. He started a group for people who suffer from PTSD or have dealt with someone who suffers from it. I couldn't figure out why Lela didn't approach Harrison about helping her son and get to the root of why he felt the way he does. It's understandable that he witnessed Beck having an episode and it scared him but why in the ever-loving HELL didn't Lela get her kid HELP??? It's driving me INSANE at the moment!

#3) Beck and Lela PROMISE to stay away from each other and for three weeks (while they're porking other people) they've only caught glimpses of each other in passing but during a chance meetup at the local firefighters kids camp where they come face-to-face with each other and their current bed-mates they're both thrown into pits of jealousy and longing. UGH! Somebody shoot me. Please! This is where I dropped the book and walked away. They see each other at the camp, realize they've both been banging other people and when they both get home with their partners, turn their sexual advances away respectively because they don't feel it's right to fuck while thinking of each-other. WHAT!!?? Am I on planet earth right now? What the fuck has changed in the three to four weeks since they started sleeping with other people up until now? Am I seriously supposed to believe that they haven't thought of each-other ONCE in all the times they've slept with who they are with now???? That Beckett hasn't put his penis inside his new lover and thought "Hmm, this feels wrong because I'm in love with another woman but Oh well. It's in there now!" or that Lela hasn't thought "Gee, I wish this was Beckett pounding into me from behind but what can ya do?". GRRR! What alternate universe does Kathryn Shay think we live in? This was soap opera style drama. Even for a Kathryn Shay novel. Especially when Lela falls down in the shower and starts crying because she knows Beckett has been sleeping with another woman. How stupid is this bitch anyway? Because she's been having sex with someone else too! Ugh. I need to stop focusing on this issue but I was really hoping they wouldn't take it so far with other people before realizing they really loved each other and tried to make it work. I guess that's my main problem. They didn't even try! So I'm supposed to believe that they magically fix everything wrong with their relationship in the 15% I had left to finish? No way. I didn't feel like there was enough time to rectify all the issues surrounding this couple. I'm not even sure this review makes sense because I was so frustrated by this book I started drinking immediately. It Had To Be You by Kathryn Shay was a bit of a surprise for me. I have read her books in the past due to my weakness for firefighter protagonists. I have found them to be enjoyable, easy reads, which is why I picked this book up the other day during a promotion on Amazon. What I did not expect was the very serious and interesting storyline weaved in about Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and how it has impacted these individuals as well as the families of returning veterans and post 9/11 firefighters.

"One out of every eighty returning soldiers kills himself on their return to society."

This is a statistic referenced in the book and vividly brought to life through the multiple characters that have to face the reasons for the statistic every day. The triggers for PTSD are not always known. And much like alcoholism or drug addiction, it cannot be cured, only managed. The book brings to light efforts, in this case Hire Our Heroes, to help those affected through initiatives that encourage appropriate employment with consideration for their condition as well as a requirement that they participate in counseling or support groups. It is common knowledge the dangers that our servicemen face, however, not much is discussed about how that danger affects them and their families. I expected fluff from this book and got some hard truth. For that, I am incredibly grateful and encourage people to read this book for the enlightenment it provides on the sacrifice so many make to keep our families safe when so often the cost is their very own families, happiness and the peace of mind we so often take for granted.

It Had To Be You is a part of Shay's Hidden Cove Series featuring the firefighters of Hidden Cove, NY. This edition is Beckett Sloan's story. Beck, as he likes to be called, served in the army for 20 years, spending extended tours in both Iraq and Afghanistan. Upon his return, and after several flashback incidents in which he injured his wife, damaged his home and terrified his son, he decided it best to divorce his wife, let them get on with their lives safely, and get some help. Through the Hire Our Heroes program, he was able to become a probationary firefighter serving on the elite Rescue Squad in the Hidden Cove fire department. As part of his job, he was required to attend a regular PTSD support group. The particular group he attended paired PTSD sufferers with family members of those affected, so that they could share their stories. It was in this group that he met Lela Allen, a former Army Media and current ER Nurse. Lela was attending this meeting because her now ex-husband had PTSD, and had hurt her as well. Both were now divorced and had young children that were greatly affected by the disorder. Suffice it to say, empathetic feelings and respect turn into friendship and later love, but the impact of PTSD on the safety of their significant others and children presented a seemingly unscalable wall for them to be together. While I never truly doubted the outcome it was not a clear path.

This book also features several couple that had tackled or were tackling similar issues. One particular couple, Nick, a recently returned and disfigured veteran, and his wife Amy, was particularly endearing. This book does indeed have the elements I expected – heroic figures, beautiful though flawed, always over the top in love with their matches, etc. (which got a bit too sickeningly sweet in their perfection even for me at times), it also featured hard topics like dangers of the job, death, PTSD, suicide, drug addiction, broken families and the emotional toll it all takes. So, I am giving this book 4 stars because everyone in this book is too perfect and altruistic and that got on my nerves, but it did not take enough away from the powerful message that with tweaks could have made this a 5 star read for me. Highly encourage any fans of contemporary romance

that love their protective heroes to read this book, as well as anyone that wants to better understand the complete sacrifice these heroes make on our behalf.
