


Accidentally Yours

Vivian St. James is in her early 30s and searching for Mr. Right. She happens to meet him over and over again, but unfortunately it's in the Emergency Room. Nearly every time she meets a guy, he ends up having to go to the ER (ulcer, cut, sprained ankle), and it's there that she meets ER doctor Zach Warner. There's an instant attraction but also bad timing since they tend to meet under less-than-ideal circumstances. I liked that the story included so many engaging subplots that had nothing to do with the central romance. There was focus on Vivian's career, family, and friends.

I downloaded this book for free on my Kindle, and I really wish I'd read some reviews of the book on here before even bothering with this book. I agree with what a lot of reviewers have pointed out as the flaws in this book: Vivian is horribly shallow and unlikeable. At one point in the ER, she notes how hard it is to tell doctors from nurses these days and then acts visibly thrilled when she learns that Zach is one of the former. Also this line when discussing how it's okay that Zach is a doctor rather than a "suit": "it's not like he teaches art to eighth graders!" Ugh. Another issue I have is the writing. I questioned the word choice at times. Also, a lot of Vivian's quirks come across as the author's personal issues. The line, "The only thing I hate more than ______ is _____" appears maddeningly, with the first blank usually being something shallow and judgmental and completely unrelated to the situation at hand. Finally, there were way too many coincidences in this book for me to take. Griffin might have been commenting on fate but everything just felt too convenient.

As much as I didn't like this book, I kept reading - almost just to see how bad it would get but also to see how the romance would play out. The fact that I finished it earns the book 2 stars and means I wouldn't completely write off Bettye Griffin as an author. This particular book just wasn't for me.

I took notes as I read the book (below)...

Overall, I don't like the main character, Vivian, very much. She's too shallow - worrying about all the wrong things. I remember worrying about finding "mr. Right" but wasn't so worried about looks, clothes, money &

spending enough. I find it really annoying. It's like the author thinks this is all normal/okay & doesn't try to fix anything... Personally, I find her too broken to have a real relationship. Another trait that makes the character unrealistic is her obsession about the things above & then saying it's okay the doctor doesn't have much money... Spent way too much time checking out his apartment, etc.

Punctuation was non-existent through most of the book (especially as characters spoke) & it made it difficult to read. Book needed a lot of work with editors to clean up inconsistencies, flow and punctuation and word use.

So many moments feel off and forced. I didn't see the issue with Mrs. Williams. She needed to make it more believable - I've been there & would have liked to really see the momma's boy part - I just didn't; had to be told it was there...

It's really too bad, because it had so much potential. In fact, I figured this was a new writer until I saw her list of books - oh, well.
