

The 70's were the decade of bellbottoms, free sex, and Julia (and the other investigators') parents. Trying to find Sabina and bring her back safely, while avoiding changing history, forms the narrative of this book. Mostly light-hearted, with a few serious events. I enjoyed this one very much, and was sad to read that it is the final chapter in this series.
