

Picking up right where #8 left off, this book shows Mia growing up and realizing who her true friends are. I thoroughly enjoyed it.

ETA 7 years later: Princess Mia continues the rejuvenation of the series that began in PD #8, building on its strengths to tell a compelling story while maintaining the series' signature humor. Cabot does a great job showing Mia's descent into depression, as well as her recovery. She also FINALLY addresses the fact that Lilly is pretty much the worst friend of all time (though I wish she would have spent more time on the schism in the friend group, instead of just throwing people onto various sides and calling it a day).

The book finally let Mia's relationship with Lana evolve, which I thought was a very deft touch (and definitely added humor through all the interactions between Lana and Mia's friends). And it really brought

home something Cabot has been deftly developing for most of the series – that Mia is no longer the awkward social pariah she was at the beginning of the series. It's been a joy binging this series and seeing Mia develop into an awesome young woman, while laughing along the whole way.

One thing that really disgruntled me, and it's in the very first diary entry – Michael is made out to be a complete savage when Mia is talking about seeing Beauty and the Beast on Broadway. There's a fine line between "boys'll be boys and he's not into it" and him snickering, complaining during the show, constantly leaving to play on his phone, and just generally being a disgrace. I get Cabot wanting to show the contrast between Michael and Mia/JP, but making him out to be so utterly contemptible is not the effect I think she was going for. I took a star off purely for ruining a perfectly good love interest like that.

There are some books I read where I wrestle with my conscience: to list it on GoodReads, or not? And so far I've always come down on the side of listing them all, even though they may not all be books I want to cop to reading. I'm listing this one and not putting it in my update feed. Maybe it'll sneak under my Smart Friends' radars, because I read this and I feel a deep shame for that fact.

Somehow I've managed to avoid the Clique/Gossip Girl/A-List types, but this series has sucked me in and won't let go. Part of it is that I do have parents at the library who ask if a series is appropriate for their kids of varying ages, and this is one of the books they ask about--because their 9- or 10-year-old daughters watched the first movie and want to read the books, but when does it take that turn for the Older Teen? (Answer: a couple of books ago.)

Mia is battling a major depression after breaking up with her boyfriend, and the resulting disinterest in

everything makes her whine a lot less about every other aspect of her life. But even without her incessant whining, this *drags*. We only get through about two weeks of minutiae: who's dating whom, X mad at Y, and lengthy IM sessions with what might be the most annoying Protagonist's Sidekick on the face of the planet.

If you've been reading this series all along and have been enjoying it, there's nothing I can say to dissuade you from picking this one up, too. But if you're trying to quit, go for it. At the end of the book, very little has changed in Mia's life. Any major changes hinted at will have to be explored in the next volume, because this one ends just short of where the plot could (but probably won't) get interesting.

This is the first book in this series that I felt I could make a full-sized review on and that's because I think this one was my favorite so far.

Characters:

Mia: I finally fully loved Mia's character in a book. I think she changed and grew a lot from the last book and she's finally realizing things that need to be realized. I almost think she's more relatable now that she's gone through her transformation. Her breakdown was believable and consistent with her character through the series.

Michael: As I've said in my review of the other books, I love Michael. I think he's great for Mia. That being said, I think I liked this book more because Michael WASN'T in it that much. This is because I do think that Mia needed some time apart from him to mature a bit and find out who she is when they're separate.

Lilly: And I think things finally went down with Lilly that I think have needed to go down for a while. Lilly has been frustrating me since the beginning (as she's meant to). Mia's always been loyal to her (I'd say that loyalty is one of Mia's best traits) and yet I'm not sure Lilly has never really deserved it. But, in truth, she's a very consistent and well-written character. You know why she's doing the things she's doing (even if Mia doesn't).

More Characters:

Boris: Such a sweetie. I love him and Tina together and I absolutely love how he's such a good friend to Mia (and everyone for that matter). He's the character in this series that I think I've slowly grown to love the most.

JP: I like him a surprising amount...Like, way more than I thought I would. I thought I would hate him just because he's, you know, not Michael. But, Meg Cabot did a great job of making him not some placeholder character. He was a great character in his own right. I can't say I'm rooting for him, but I will say I love him. **Tina:** SO SWEET. Another one of my favorites (and she has been since the very first book). She's such a perfect friend to Mia (who has always needed a friend the exact opposite of what Lilly is).

This is one of the series that I honestly never thought I'd ever read. It was one of the ones that I thought I had stumbled onto too late to truly enjoy. But I'm finding myself really sad that the next

book I have to read is the last one. Sure, these books are ridiculous and silly and not high-literature or whatever, but these characters became real to me in a way that few do. They felt like real people and real friends that I could laugh with and cry with. I'm glad that I gave them a chance and took the time to read this ridiculous and silly and just plain fun series.

This was one of the better ones of this series, to which I am totally and completely addicted. I laugh until I cry every time, but this one was actually . . . well, kinda serious, and that's a good thing. Michael has broken up with Mia, Lilly's not talking to her, she's discovered a terrible secret about Genovian history, and Cabot handles it all expertly. I've seen this book criticized for making light of depression, since Mia's parents send her to therapy because she's upset about Michael. As someone who has suffered from depression, I was not offended at all. With everything that Mia was going through, I was glad that Cabot recognized that this would affect her emotional and psychological state. Although this was handled with Cabot's usual humorous, light touch, I thought that it was totally believable and handled quite well. In fact, this is probably my favorite next to the first book, because everything finally comes to a head: Lilly's fair-weather-friendship, her relationship with Michael, her duty as a royal, even her issues with Lana Weinberger. Two thumbs way, way up!

"Do one thing every day that frightens you," Princess Mia advised her audience. "And never think that you can't make a difference. Even if you're only sixteen, and everyone is telling you that you're just a silly teenage girl—don't let them push you away. Overall it was an okay book but nothing more than that. I'm pretty sick of Princess diaries and luckily I only have two books left to read.

I think the depiction of depression was absolutely horrible, depression is in fact mental illness and very dangerous. It isn't something you should take lightly and you definitely shouldn't throw that word around without knowing what it is. I'm sure the author is very aware about what it is and what it does to people, BUT she failed to put that into words. Depression isn't when you and your boyfriend decide to take a break and you feel down afterwards (because who wouldn't feel sad about that?) and I got so annoyed when it was so obvious that she used "depression" to get sympathy for the main character. You can get depressed because of a breakup, yes, it's definitely possible. But it's absolutely normal to feel down the days after it happened. Mia continues to appear whiny and immature, Lily is a horrible person and J.P appears to be even more annoying with his uncomfortable stalker behaviour, and basically the only thing I liked with this book was the relationship with Mia's former enemy Lana Weinberg and the development in that aspect plus Mia stepping up a bit in the end. But she's still very annoying. And she's suppose to be older than me. Geez. Meg Cabot is smart for sure, because now Mia can have her happily ever after with Michael without these complications mentioned in the previous books. Plus it's so stereotypical and it bothered me a bit (because why tell young girls that you have to transform and become hot because otherwise nobody wants you), the

flat chested ugly girl with the unbearable hair FINALLY has her glow up while she's eating meat and stopped being a vegetarian and now FINALLY "grew up" and is hot so all the boys steal glances of her while they're passing by.

Ok so... this is maybe one of my biggest complaints that applies to the series as a whole. Why do I care so little about Michael? Is it my fault? Because Mia is unhealthily obsessed with him, and, from what I've seen, hard-core fans of the series are head over heels for the boy as well. But he's been included so infrequently in the series (apart from the first few books) that I just plain don't give a rip about their relationship.
