

Not only is this a very easy-to-understand guide on crafting a speech, but he leaves no element of the speaking environment untouched, including the preparation, even the lighting and sound! The great parts of this book were the last few chapters on humor and illustrations. Especially as a Christian, the use of humor in public speaking can be tricky, and Davis treads these waters with grace and humility, and the treatment of gathering illustrations for speeches was a helpful section, I think even more so for people who speak often and regularly. For the casual speech-giver, it may not be as helpful.

Just one critique to be given (from a pastor's perspective): I think the scope of the book was narrow in the Christian setting. Understandably, Davis wants to appeal to a larger audience than just the pastor or christian speaker, but he left many things to be said for crafting sermons, and christian speaking in general. He gives a great way to prepare if a pastor were speaking topically (minus that whole prayer thing), but as someone who believes in expository preaching, his method seemed difficult to reconcile with preparing an exposition of a biblical text.

The topic in expository preaching isn't always the "most relevant" to the audience in the sense that the pastor chooses something to preach on that resonates with the church, rather the word of God is always relevant to God's people, and as the pastor faithfully prepares a sermon, he cannot and should not twist the Scriptures to say what he wants, but must be a communicator of what God's truth already says. His job is to allow the Spirit to apply the word to the hearts of his hearers.

In short, this is a great, effective, articulate and short book on preparing great topical speeches. I would recommend this book to people like my sister, who give speeches at schools and in other public settings. But I might not recommend it to a pastor.

In Secrets of Dynamic Communications, Ken Davis takes us through the basics of preparing for public speaking and how we can maximize our impact when we are communicating to a large group. Over all what Davis delivers is insightful, but nothing too new to anyone who has study the subject of communication or preaching. The first half he targets the main problem with most speeches/preaches is that they lack focus in their message. He takes us through step-by-step using the SCORRE method (see picture below for me information) to help us develop clear and focused messages. In the later chapters he turns his attention towards delivery and application.

Davis's writing style is easy to ready. He brings in lots of stories and illustrations, which help the reader to fully grasp what he is trying to convey. If you are anything like me and like to take notes, highlight, and

underline in your books, then I would highly recommend you get a print copy and not the digital form of this book. It has lot of information and you will want to be able to go back to it and reference things. I can't tell you the countless times I wanted to throw my iPad because I just wanted to easily flip back to that ONE diagram. But over all I think this is a great read for those who are new to public speaking or need a little refreshing.

Looking for the secret to a power-packed speech? Secrets of Dynamic Communication provides a formula to make every presentation successful. Anyone who seeks "to instruct, encourage, motivate, or call an audience to action" (p. 20) will benefit from the tools provided within its pages. That includes high school teachers, Sunday School teachers, and every kind of teacher in-between. The author, Ken Davis, goes into great detail to spell out the difference between an average talk and a memorable one. He uses 40 years of experience to analyze the nuts and bolts of a great speech, and to equip others to evaluate their own presentations. As a speaker, I have sought out many books on the art of developing an address, and put many of the tips gleaned therein to the test. This book is very user-friendly in breaking down the format into easy-to-remember steps, acrostics and examples that clarify instructions. Chapter Reviews reinforce material covered, and the Appendix gives a springboard for talks by listing examples, key words and topical indexes. The real genius of the book, however, is in the spreadsheet for SCORRE, the acronym for Davis' formula and conference of the same name. Just two weeks ago, it provided a map, when I had the honor of speaking at a close friend's funeral. It was a time when every word counted, and had to be just right. He drafted the first version back in 1991, got famous for conferences and training on this topic. Now, a revised and revamped version of Secrets of Dynamic Communication, aimed at both beginners and experienced presenters is a guideline for presentations of all kinds, whether it's your next sales pitch, Sunday's sermon or conference slot. is a practical and effective handbook for powerful presentations of all kinds. The first half is an elaboration on the SCORRE acronym for the preparation phase. With a Subject, Central theme and Objective you'll get the focus on the reason behind and what you're trying to convey in your presentation. You have to select, narrow your focus and really spend time on preparation. With a solid Rationale and Resources you build your presentation structure and add examples, illustrations and evidence to it. With an on-going Evaluation you make sure you stay on track and learn from experience. The second part of the book is devoted to the delivery of the presentation. All kinds of important aspects that can support or break your performance are highlighted: from your cloths and body language to the lighting

and sound system. Time management and humor and involvement of your audience both during the presentation and afterwards are described. Apart from the mics and lights Davis stays away from presentation software or the use of modern technology / social media in presenting. First things first: the skill set of presenting, which seems to have a timeless character.

The reader will find the appendix full of examples, ranging from topics, key words, types of talks;(persuasive or enabling), and a worksheet to help a speaker outline any given speech.
