Cam goes to the mall with her dad and friend Eric. They decide to eat something before doing their actual shopping. Cam and Eric look for a table to eat at in a pizza shop while Cam's dad orders, but then the kids leave the table unattended. Cam's jacket, which was left at the table, goes missing. A pizza shop customer has, of course, taken it by accident--and that's not a problem. However, the fact that absolutely no development went into the character who took it, including the reason why a character would take the jacket and leave a meal on the table, is a problem.

Because of the lack of character development and motivation, the book is quite a confusing read for the targeted audience. Not recommended.

The motif of Cam Jansen's "click" noise she makes when she is remembering something gives the reader a heads up at what should be considered while solving another one of her mysteries. The illustrations by Susanna Natti are amazingly cohesive to the story that Adler is telling. The series, this book specifically, is highly recommended by myself for the age appropriate reader.
