


Your First Two Years in Youth Ministry: A Personal and Practical Guide to Starting Right

There's just so much good information and advice in this book that it's easily a must-read for anyone about to be in youth ministry, is currently serving in youth ministry, or has an interest but doesn't know what to expect. Though I could do without his attempts at humor at times, and odd wordplay, I did enjoy this book. It is certainly meant to be taken slow, however. Each chapter is thick with information (though some do drag quite a bit) and tips on ministry that are better consumed slowly, and with plenty of thought afterwards.
