Even in his Caldecott-Medal-winning *Smoky Night* I don't believe that illustrator David Diaz was ever more impressive than in his creation of the artwork for *Before You Came*. Bursting with pure colors and the unbridled energy of light, the pictures in this book create a surrounding atmosphere of a mother's joy at the coming of her baby that lifts the story and makes it memorable, and adds emphasis to the message of how much a child can mean in the life of a parent, even one who seemingly already has it all.

The mother in the story tells all about the goodness of her life before her baby came, filled with love and excitement and virtually every form of beauty that one could hope to experience. She wasn't lacking

anything important, really, and was happy with the life she led; however, after the blessing of a new baby is added to all that she has, the mother realizes that there was still further room for gain in a life that had already seemed so full. I guess there's always room for more goodness in a person's life if one is willing to stay open to receiving it.

Lovely and affectionate, *Before You Came* is yet another solid collaboration between the writing team of Newbery Medalist Patricia MacLachlan and her daughter, Emily MacLachlan Charest. It contains some of the most striking artwork to be found in any picture book of 2011, and I enjoyed reading it.

Before you came, your parents lived their lives, but when you joined them, you colored their world. Immerse yourself in the love as Newbery medalist Patricia MacLachlan teams with her own daughter, Emily MacLachlan Charest, to make 2011 an especially beautiful time to be born. The glowing, spiral haired protaginist tells her child of all she loved before she became a mother, from the red canoe she rowed, to enjoying a book in the outdoors while Papa plays guitar. The lyrical list spans most of the book, curling itself through the pages until, with a final swell, her child comes. She declares all she had is now for him, deciding, "I used to think I had everything. And now I do. I have you."

Fraught with ethereal radiance, an array of lovely textures, and spice-tinged flavor to the tropical air, Diaz's vibrantly colored, swirling illustrations suggest an undeniable kinetic energy simmering gently beneath dreamy landscapes where the characters loll to and fro, swaying out their welcome to their new arrival.

It's really very sweet. The illustrations are unusual for a children's book but I think we need that now and then.

Wow. This really, really wasn't what I expected. I thought that Before You Came would be about a mother telling her child what her life was like before, and it is, but not in a way that would encapsulate a common experience (something like, "I got married to your daddy" or "I went to college," which, yes, I know, aren't universal experiences). What you get with Before You Came is a lyrical and wonder-filled story of nature. For example, who has a canoe?

Everything is undeniably beautiful, from the text to the illustration, but the illustrations are too eye-searingly neon for my personal taste. It must be an issue of preference, because I wasn't the biggest fan of illustrator Diaz's Newbery winning Smoky Night, either. I do think that this would be a beautiful book to read aloud to your child (though I still much prefer The Runaway Bunny), or in a storytime.
