She goes to the keep of Fane Linford the Sherriff of Warringham. Her goal is to seduce him and steal the paper she needs to clear her brothers name, then slip out into the night with no one the wiser.

However, her plan fails. Bombs. Fane figures Rexana was the dancer at his gathering and blackmails her into becoming his wife. She reluctantly accepts.

Fane is the sheriff, appointed by the king. He fought during the crusades and took a liking to the culture of the "savages." His preference for all things savage put a stain on his reputation and people think he has become "one of them."

There were some confusing parts and small inconsistencies to the book. Even mistakes. There was a time when Rexana was supposed to leave on horseback but then in the next paragraph she's back with Fane.

The author added in a lot of tension for the reader. Rexana and Fane really liked making each other suffer and the reader gets a first class seat to see what they do to each other.

The author took her time in setting up a bond between the two characters. When they first marry, Rexana doesn't trust Fane at all. So the author created time where the characters get to know each other and form a sort of friendship and trust. But trust is fleeting as Rexana tries to save her brother, which means she has to go against Fane. It was a lot of back and forth with these two.

The two characters really liked playing games with each other and making themselves miserable. While tension is good and interesting, this author took it a bit too far.

I disliked the poem that Fane wrote. I found it cheesy and something I could never take seriously. Rexana liked it though. "Tis a most seductive poem. you woo my heart and body with words."

The author was pretty good at using words and phrases from this time frame. That's hard to do considering their way of talking would be very foreign to us. There were a few times when the characters were not accurate but all in all, it was pretty close. More believable than some other books out there.

I think the author should have used Fane's secrets more and told the reader about them sooner. I also didn't care for how Thomas came into the picture.

Overall, this is a typical medieval romance, if you are in the mood. It is not clean, by any means, but not overly dirty. I think the first part of the book is better than the second half. I liked the battle. Rexana is a very hard headed, stubborn character that was strangely not very proactive until the end. I liked the way the author

used description and details of the age. If you like medieval romance novels, this is one to check out but beware the two characters play a lot of games and trust is a big issue with the two. This may come off as unromantic to you or it may not.
