Having enjoyed Helen Phifer's Dark House, which introduces us to Detective Lucy Harwin, I couldn't wait to continue with the series and read Dying Breath. I did get a sense of deja vu because the opening was fantastic, the middle gripped me but the ending I once again saw coming from a mile away.

Brooklyn Bay as I said in my review of Dark House is well-imagined and it's not a place that I would want to live. When two seemingly unconnected murders occur, it's up to Lucy and her team to try and work out what the connection is and apprehend the killer. When a family is then massacred as well, things become a whole lot more complicated for the team. With so many crime series it can be hard to come up with a story that hasn't been done in some way or another before, I enjoyed the story here and felt it had originality but I felt it could have perhaps been explored further.

I love gruesome and brutal crime fiction and Helen does not shy away from being very descriptive when it comes to the murder scenes within this book. It's gripping stuff and intriguing as well as we follow the killer and really get inside his head. The upbringing of this person was more than a little creepy and whilst I was left with so many questions about this character's upbringing, I was hooked on the story as I read. As with Dark House I found myself reading it at every available opportunity.

Lucy is a fantastic character. I enjoyed the developments here with her daughter and I liked the fact that despite the events of Dark House leaving her a little on edge, she seemed more in control of her life and career in this book (I just wish she would choose a man and settle on him, it seems half of Brooklyn Bay is after her). The sign of a good series for me is when I enjoy the scenes of normality (e.g. Lucy just pottering around the house) as much as the main story arc because it's a sign that I am invested in a character and want to read about them, and I can definitely say that about Lucy. I also love Mattie as well and there's some great scenes between the two characters throughout.

Helen's writing really draws you in and keeps you hooked. Each chapter ends and just makes you want to read on. And on, and on. This was a book that left me annoyed when I had to stop reading it. I love Helen's storytelling and, I noticed this in Dark House as well, she constantly mentions what food her characters are going to eat (or in the case of a wonderful sounding Italian, abandon) and it just makes me salivate. As somebody who hasn't had a takeaway for 18 days (not that I'm counting) it's agonising to read about pizzas and Chinese and Coke and whatever else these characters eat in between work. This isn't a negative however it just makes me feel jealous that I (for now!) can't eat the stuff.

Unfortunately despite such a strong plot that had me gripped, as with Dark House I did work out who the killer was going to be. I wasn't 100% sure initially and did at one point suspect somebody else but it turns out the one I eventually settled on was correct. It's a shame because apart from making the ending a little lacklustre, the rest of the book was faultless but this being the second time that I've worked the story out before the reveal is a real shame. Other than that I can't recommend these books more highly and I can't wait for the next one.

After giving the first book 4.5 stars there was nowhere else to go with this, it had to be five stars.

Detective Lucy Harwin is back, only a few months after the events of book 1 which nearly killer her. Three seemingly unrelated murder scenes in Brooklyn Bay have the police scratching their heads. The modus operandi is different in all three cases, the victimology is different. There seem to be no links. But - it eventually becomes apparent that the killer is replicating famous murders from history. Now they only have to work out which famous murder is going to be copied next, and how to prevent that.

This book is heavy on the creep factor. We get a few glimpses into the killer's head and its not pretty. The pace is relentless and the tension just keeps ratcheting up. Cat and mouse, cat and mouse. Lucy Harwin is a great detective and a pretty nice person. But this killer is a nasty piece of work with very dark fantasies. And Lucy is to be his latest prize. Can she save herself and bag this monster? I really hope there are to be more Lucy Harwin books because this series is a winner.

Police procedural and thriller

Detective Inspector Lucy Harwin runs a tight team out of Brooklyn Bay and, in this second book in the series, she's dealing with a very complicated string of murders that may or may not be connected. As the investigation proceeds, Lucy also deals with her personal issues at home and some changes at the station. Meanwhile, a killer is out looking for his next victim.

This fast-paced story is told from the point of view of the criminal as well as from Lucy. Though there are indications of his identity throughout, along with his backstory, it isn't until the climax that he is revealed. Most readers of this genre will anticipate the confrontation between the two and the ultimate conclusion.

I liked the characters, however stereotypical to police and crime novels featuring female protagonists. Lucy is as spunky and as appealing as any in her role, and her male subordinates and bosses both respect her and have her back. She suffers romantic attention as well -- but I hope none of those develop into full blown relationships!

The most interesting piece of this book was the backstory of the man behind the murders. His childhood and association to the infamous Carnival Queen Killer -- but I'll say no more to avoid any spoilers. I did enjoy this and wish I had read the first book in the series prior to this one as there are references to previous cases. I like to see how a character changes and grows as new stories are published.

Lucy is called out to a dead body who has been beaten with a hammer and posed. Her alarm bells are ringing and confirmed when a second strangled body is found a few days later. If that is not enough she has an unearthed skeleton and a new colleague she doesn't like to contend with.

I thoroughly enjoyed Dying Breath as its twists, turns and very likeable protagonist kept me enthralled from

start to finish and I read it in one sitting. The plotting and writing are excellent and had me barking up the wrong tree for the whole novel as intended. The novel is told from several points of view but chiefly Lucy and the unnamed killer. "He turned to take one last look at the man who had changed from a monster into his hero, and he grinned at him." is one of them. It may not seem like much on its own, but when read in context you will feel chills up your spine.

Dark and twisty, Dying Breath had me wondering just who this child had grown up to become, because we never knew his name. . .but we knew what he had become and his life ambition. There are several people he could be, all of whom have some type of fixation on Lucy.

I write this knowing full well I'm surrounded by 5 star reviews so please file this in your ? **Danger, Will Robinson! Unpopular Opinions Ahead!** ? category.

I'm so conflicted about *Dying Breath*. By the time I'd finished the first chapter I'd searched Amazon for the first book in the series. By chapter five I no longer wanted to read it and wondered if I'd even make it through this book. By halfway through I wanted to read the first one again. Then partway through the second

half I no longer wanted to and could have DNF'ed it (and would have if I hadn't committed to reviewing it). Now? I honestly don't know.

Before I go any further, a word of warning. If you plan on reading this series I highly recommend reading them in order. During the course of this book I learned the name of book 1's killer and what happened to them, so any suspense I would have had if I decide to read *The Lost Children* has gone bye byes.

What mostly ruined any potential for suspense for me in *Dying Breath* was that the blurb gave away **way** too much. Before reading the first sentence of this book I knew how the first two victims were going to die and I knew that this was a copycat killer using infamous serial killers as their inspiration. While reading I kept waiting for the cops to work this out and it takes until after 70% for this to happen. Had I not known that the killer was copying famous murder scenes I imagine I would have wondered along with the police and there would have been some satisfaction upon uncovering the truth instead of me muttering, "Finally!" under my breath.

I enjoyed reading about the killer's upbringing and pivotal moments in their life that influenced their development down the dark, twisty murder path. The sections from their perspective were my favourite scenes and I wanted more of those.

Part of my problem is that I always compare books in this genre to Tess Gerritsen's *Rizzoli & Isles* series. I love the banter between the characters. I love the intricacies of the murders and subsequent investigations. I love the baddies with their own backstories and foibles. I love that the 'minor' characters are so well thought out that you feel like you know them as well and can figure out who's speaking without an "X said".

Knowing that this is what I'm looking for, here are some of my observations about this book:

- * The banter between characters there wasn't the ease in conversations that comes with people who have worked together and seen each other at their best and worst. I didn't feel like I was being included in inside jokes or that there really were any.
- * I actually found some of the conversations too polite ("I prefer to believe it's because you're so good at your job.") and others cringeworthy ("Aren't we lucky that we're all so bloody good at working this stuff out and catching the bad guys and girls.")
- * No one seemed to have a specific 'voice'. I couldn't tell who was who from the way they spoke and sometimes I didn't even know who was speaking after I was told their name because there wasn't a personality, quirk or feature I could attach to some of the characters to be able to tell them apart for a long time.
- * The characters didn't have the confidence in their abilities that I would have liked to have seen. "Catherine smiled at Lucy, making her feel a whole lot better. If the doctor thought she was on to something, there was a good chance she really was. She didn't often agree with anyone." And another. "Is that okay?"
- * Some of the wording was awkward. "It's not for me to say for definite."
- * The main character's controlling is he or isn't he boyfriend. "She wasn't sure whether she was flattered by his persistence or annoyed that he hadn't taken any notice of her telling him she wasn't interested." Please, girl, grow some self esteem!

* Apparently in Brooklyn Bay the ambulance service are seriously underfunded. "One of the paramedics looked up at Mattie. 'We need to get him to the hospital now but we both need to work on him - is there someone to drive the ambulance." Ooh! Pick me!

There was a sentence in Chapter 21 that gave away who the murderer was. There were red herrings but I'd already fixated on this person. The murderer takes pride in everything being absolutely perfect, well planned and executed. However, there's one murder in particular that they don't copy exactly because they don't want to have to deal with the clean up of blood. Don't just **not** stab the person. If you want to be a copycat you either stab the person and deal with the blood or choose another murder to copy that doesn't involve so much blood.

For most of the murders it's vital that the victim matches the original one as closely as possible. Then there's a murder where it doesn't matter to the killer if the victim is male or female. With the personality of the killer and their meticulous planning, these things are simply incongruent. So, did we catch the murderer because of our brilliant logic, deductive reasoning and pure brilliance? Nope, we found them by accident.

My favourite character was Toby's nan. She may have only been in a few pages but that woman has attitude, grit and I loved her. You don't need to feature in a book to be memorable to me. I just want people to have distinct personalities.

Just a few burning unresolved questions ...

- * What happens to Mal? Did what Lucy tell him make things better or worse for him?
- * What eventually happens to the murderer? The end of the book just cut off before that character was resolved enough for me.

After all of this it may sound like I hated this book. I didn't. It's just it had so much potential and with some further editing it could have been a superstar, so I'm mostly disappointed by what could have been. I still enjoyed reading it. There were times I could forget about my question marks and simply enjoy the ride but not as often or as long as I would've liked. I'm still thinking about whether I'll read the first book or not. I'm interested in reading the next instalment because despite what I've said above I do believe there is a gem to be found here. It just needs to be polished.

Well I just loved this book. I've had a couple of so so reads recently and wasn't particularly in the mood of starting another book when I opened this one. However, literally from the first page I was drawn in. The
