

History has seldom, if ever, been kind to women, and this is part of the reason I enjoy historical romances so much; it's like taking back and reconquering periods during which we were oppressed. It's also heavy on the fantasy and fairy tale elements, given that the sort of romance between classes we often see in historical fiction is highly unlikely to have happened in fact (at least insofar as matrimonial prospects are concerned).

Happily, this is exactly the kind of romance that blossoms between the main characters of Eva Devon's Less Than a Lady, actress extraordinaire and Puritan's daughter Amelia Fox and Darcy Blake, Earl of Chase and friend to the king.

As you can tell from the synopsis quoted above, this is not purely a romance. There is quite a bit of intrigue in the story as well, although perhaps not so much mystery as political wheeling and dealing. So if you are the type of person who likes more than just a love story in romance novels, you won't be disappointed. But if you do like the love story to remain front and center when you're reading a novel, don't worry. Devon maintains a good balance of both intrigue and romantic elements, so that it's as if the suspense and politics only serve to intensify the urgency of the romance, while the love story adds drama and a personal, emotional element to the machinations of those who serve king and country.

The one thing that felt a little flat, at least for me, was the way Darcy's grand sacrifice at the end was overturned. I mean, I understand why this was done, and part of my heart was even wishing it would happen for them, but at the same time, I thought that letting that gesture stand would have made for a stronger story and, in many ways, a more believable happily ever after. I felt that revoking it kind of had the effect of depriving the hero and heroine of that iconic ride into the sunset, with the assumption that they would face the challenges of an unknown future together, secure in their love if not much else. Still, if the move was one that absolutely had to be made (which I hope is because the characters will feature in more books in a series?), I have to applaud Devon in the way she did it, which was with both humor and affection. I just wish it didn't have to be done that way.

Still, this was a very minor point and quite subjective; I'm sure many other readers will prefer it the way it is. What really won me over as far as this novel goes was the way Devon fleshed out the characters. Both Darcy and Amelia are multilayered characters who must juggle complicated relationships with the colorful, and in some cases unhappy people in their lives.

This is particularly true of Amelia, who grew up tyrannized by a horribly puritanical—and dangerously devout and bigoted—father; worse, her brother has always keenly felt that same father's disappointment with him. In fact, it's this brother's attempt at garnering some sort of posthumous parental approval that helps create the main conflict of the novel and lands Darcy and Amelia in politically hot water. And it doesn't just put a strain on their relationship, either. It imperils their very lives.

But I just loved the strength and grace with which Amelia dealt with every obstacle thrown in her direction, and I also enjoyed how Darcy really stepped up and became the sort of man who deserved to be at the side of a woman like her. About halfway through the novel, you already get forebodings of what Darcy will have to do not just to prove his love, but to secure their future, and so it means more when he takes that leap. Meanwhile, Amelia doesn't just show grace under fire, but she also shows mercy and understanding in the face of hate and bigotry.

The overall effect is that Less Than a Lady isn't just a love story about two strong, dynamic individuals who choose to be together come what may, although that's certainly a big part of it. It's also a love story about forgiveness, empathy, and compassion. And it's a solid read in my book, so I'm looking forward to reading more from this author.

Amelia has been given the daunting task, and admittedly somewhat amusing task of teaching the Earl of Chase how to be a woman. Apparently the King is expecting Darcy to take part in a production for his own amusement – and that will require Darcy to know how to put on a corset (everyone knows he is quite talented at taking one off of a woman). Normally this role reversal would not amuse Darcy in the least – but he is on a mission for his King and he is hoping very much that the King is wrong about Amelia's traitorous activities.

Less Than A Lady is set in the time period of King Charles. And although not unheard of, it is a unique time with far different events, rules and expectations. But then love is timeless.

I enjoyed Darcy and Amelia's romance. During this time period the real danger of traitors to the Crown was very vivid and real. Unfortunately just as many innocent people were caught up in the protection of the monarchy as were actual traitors. Amelia's younger brother is foolish but no traitor, unfortunately his actions

could land them both in a lot of trouble. Darcy had a mission, the last thing he expected was for Amelia to capture his heart – or the lengths he would go to in order to protect her. He has recently been returned to the throne in England, but there are still many of Cromwell's supporters eager to usurp him off that throne at the first possible opportunity. Charles II and his supporters must take every care that that does not happen.

Darcy Blake is the Earl of Chase, and one of the King's Men. He's a bit of a rogue too, and finds himself in front of the King both to be given a new mission, plus a punishment of sorts for having 'relations' with a married woman that he should have stayed well away from. Darcy is the embodiment of all that is a man, his masculinity oozes from him. When he finds out what his mission is he definitely is not amused.

Amelia Fox is one of London's finest actresses, and she adores her profession. She isn't too keen on the reputation actresses have of all being loose women, for she definitely Isn't one, but she's not about to give up doing what she loves purely because of people's misconceptions of her. Unfortunately despite being a supporter of King Charles, Amelia's brother, and now deceased father were very much on Cromwell's side. Her father even wrote pamphlets and organised meetings about ousting the King. Since his death, Amelia changed her last name, and is very much relieved to not be privy to any of the wrong- doing that her father was caught up in.

Information has reached King Charles that Amelia and her brother could be committing treason against him, so to kill two birds with one stone, the King decides that Darcy must have private lessons from Amelia. He is to learn how to act and dress as a woman so he can perform in a private play for the King's entertainment. While in Amelia's company he is to quietly watch her and learn what he can about what she and her brother are involved in. Of course if he has proof that they are conspiring against the King he must turn them over as traitors and they will be hung or beheaded. Darcy is more than happy to do the job for the King, but he's horrified that he has to dress as a woman. A man as masculine as Darcy shouldn't be wearing corsets and skirts even in a play! The ultimate punishment for him from his King.

The problems arise for him when after spending time with Amelia, he finds himself infatuated with her. Perhaps even more than infatuation. He is torn between his feelings for her and his gut feeling that she can't be even thinking treasonous thoughts, and all the proof that he is finding which point to both her and her brother being highly involved with the enemy! Amelia, "Mrs Fox" isn't of course married. A popular actress of renown beauty she is wildly feted & hotly pursued by a mass of male admirers hoping to be her protector but unbeknownst to all including our intrepid hero, she is totally chaste & has every intention of keeping her honor intact. When the King requests for her to train the Earl of Chase (Darcy) to act a woman's role in a court play, she finds herself for the first time having a hard time resisting the handsome Earl.

Darcy is a loyal King's man whose family has always done their duty to the crown. When he is ordered to investigate if Amelia & her younger brother are involved in treasonous activities, he did not expect to find himself wildly conflicted in protecting Amelia when all evidence points to her guilt.

The relationship between Darcy & Amelia starts off, as expected, with a strong attraction on both ends. Darcy doing his best to seduce her (& being totally seduced by her) while Amelia has her hands full trying to keep him at arms length. The acting lessons provide witty banter & amusing scenes (Darcy donning a corset for the 1st time!).

Quite a charming story which gets better towards the end. The last third of the book is the best part showing a better depth of the characters and overall storyline compared to the earlier parts which is in a lighter vein.

Less Than a Lady was absolutely wonderful! We start out with an Earl trying on a dress by order of the king. Definitely an interesting way to get a book started. Darcy is wearing a dress so that he can go undercover to find traitors in the world of London theater. His mark is actress Amelia - famous in the theater and one of the most beautiful ladies in London.

Amelia Fox is a beautiful actress, well respected and renowned for her talent on stage. What I most admired about her is that she is intelligent, honorable, and loyal.

The king suspects Amelia involved in treason or affiliated with persons responsible for treasonous acts upon the crown and enlists Darcy Blake, Earl of Chase, to spy on her. Darcy has to pretend to be Amelia's student, to be schooled on how to act as a woman for the next theatrical play for the king's court. All the while, his mission is to spy on Amelia and find any connection of treason. As Darcy is a rogue and a man's man, he is nothing close to looking like a woman. The lessons of him fitting a corset was quite amusing, and couldn't help but have a laugh-out-loud moment. Amelia and Darcy can't deny the attraction between them, and she's finding it hard to resist his attempts of seduction. At a ball, Amelia is blackmailed into intrigue.
