Sabrina is a spoiled rotten rich girl with nothing to do but spend money and go to parties. But her life changes when her little sister is abducted. Sabrina must find her sister and return her home to her parents. She enlists the help of an ex-conman, Waco, who knows the country. Can she live with the consequences of her actions and be able to find her sister alive?

I'm a fan of this author, but was disappointed with the first book in the series. This book was slightly better than book 1, but still lacked the suspense and character depth that I recall from his earlier books. The plot jumps between the two main characters until they meet about half way through the book. With Sabrina it seems to be mostly filler trying to explain why she's a spoiled princess. Several things seemed a little off to me.

- 1. The father let his eldest daughter go find her sister. No respectable man would allow his daughter to go unchaperoned out west. Why didn't he join her when she first left instead of almost at the end of the story?
- 2. The main male character, Waco, seems very shallow in his love for Sabrina. The author portrays him as the grunt and not very smart in the beginning and all of the sudden he is smart enough to plan a capture. It just doesn't come together well.
- 3. The ending seemed really, really rushed. I would have been very skeptical about everything if I was Sabrina. But she seemed totally ok with the sudden change in feelings. Just too rushed for me.

While it was enjoyable to quickly read through the book, I didn't feel the suspense or romance that I expected to get from this book. Maybe my expectations were too high due to my fond memories of reading the authors books as a child. But I have been disappointed with the series so far.

I have been on the prowl for a riveting adventure in the Wild West, and I am pleased to say I found it here in Sabrina's Man. It has everything one would hope for in such a novel; outlaws, Southern belles, a misunderstood hero, gun fights, betrayal, true love...By the end, looking back at the novel as a whole, I think the story was very well put together and had a great cast with different backgrounds.

Another thing I liked is the Christianity in this novel. It did not come across as preachy at all (maybe in one or two instances from a character or two), but mostly, the characters discuss their beliefs, the love of Christ and redemption in a believable way. I really enjoyed that.

When I rate this 3 stars, I'd say it's more appropriate to be 3.5. Often, I felt rushed through scenes, being told what is going on rather than shown. Sometimes, the dialogue felt forced and unnatural, and on occasion, it also seemed unrealistic for the time period. It didn't ruin the book for me at all, but it was something I noticed.

Overall, I enjoyed this novel and wouldn't mind reading it again in the future.

This story is the second book in the Western Justice series with the first book being Rosa's Land. It begins in 1864 in Arkansas and continues into 1870 for the biggest portion of the book. The main characters are Waco Smith, a soldier/outlaw/prisoner and Sabrina Warren, a pampered, rich 24-year-old. There are some supporting characters, but they don't really add too much to the plot.

Sabrina is always used to getting her way. Her younger sister, Marianne, falls in love with a shady character and Sabrina tells her to not see him anymore. Her sister refuses and runs away with the guy. Sabrina is convinced she is being held against her will and sets off to rescue her. She learns they are headed for Oklahoma Indian Territory, so that's where she goes. She sees the judge in charge of law enforcement for the area and he has no marshals to spare to help Sabrina rescue her sister. Waco Smith has done a good turn for the prison warden and he is given a conditional pardon for the rest of his jail time if he will help Sabrina retrieve her sister. Waco agrees as he has a personal grudge against the man who has taken Marianne. The journey to rescue Marianne begins, but at what cost?

I didn't like this book at all except for the descriptions of the western scenery. The story was disjointed, the characters flat and unlikable and the plot unrealistic. The main female character is a spoiled brat and I didn't feel her change genuine. I've read other Gilbert Morris books and enjoyed them, but this one for me was not worth reading. There is a third book in the series titled, Raina's Choice, due to be released in June 2014. I will probably give this author another chance to earn my interest by reading this third book because of his other good books. I can't recommend this second book, however.

SABRINA'S MAN is the second installment in the Western Justice Series.

Sabrina Warren is your typical spoiled southern belle. Used to getting whatever she wants, Sabrina pays little

mind to anyone but herself. But, when her younger sister is romanced by a wicked con-man in disguise and is whisked away to parts unknown, Sabrina's love for her sister fuels her determination to see her sister safely returned home.

Waco Smith hasn't had the easiest life, but things are looking up. As a partner in a successful hardware store and courting the lovely Alice Malone, Waco sees nothing but blue skies ahead. That is until he is forced to rejoin the Confederate Army. While away, his life is changed, turning Waco into a bitter and angry man. Turning to a life of crime, he finds himself serving time in jail when his act of heroism garners him the possibility of a shortened sentence. If he will help Miss Sabrina Warren free her sister from the clutches of the vile Trey LeBeau, he will be pardoned for his crime.

Sabrina hates the fact that she has to rely on a criminal to help her find her sister. But she has no alternatives. Waco Smith is the only person who can work himself into LeBeau's gang and devise a plan to free her sister. Along the way, Sabrina is transformed from spoiled debutante into a gritty and determined woman. Her impression of Waco undergoes a transformation as well, one that has her heart tied in knots.

Gilbert Morris has a very deliberant writing style. Dividing the book into four parts, each section concentrates on a timeframe in each of the lead characters' life, setting up the story for the time that their two paths cross. At first I found this distracting, now I realize it is just the style in which Morris prefers to write. Much like ROSA's LAND, Morris takes a man that is not your typical hero type, and turns him into just that. Waco is quite and solemn, and his feelings for Sabrina grow slowly and without his permission. He sees himself as unchangeable and unworthy of her love, but that doesn't keep him from protecting Sabrina and wanting to see her sister safely home.

The Western Justice series is unique in its delivery, but it grows on you. I have already started RAINA'S CHOICE, and I'm excited to be treated to another fascinating story from Gilbert Morris.
