I enjoyed this book and read it in one seating. There's no heavy typological or foreshadowing of Christ here. What we get instead are plenty of lively stories from Banning's (and family's) life and ministry. He attempts to communicate a simple message - to be rooted intimately with God, in service to him and in the context of a community.

I was constantly engaged with the unfolding thesis of the book, and was kept hooked from the get go. The plentiful sharing of the real-life memories and experiences (especially the painful/embarrassing ones) helped Banning connect with a young reader like myself. I appreciated the authenticity and vulnerability thoroughly. I'd probably increase the 4 stars to 5 if more emphasis (and pages) was placed on the necessity of the believer actively seeking to be rooted in the 3 soils (Intimacy, serving, community).

I'm actually conflicted as to whether I wished he had gone in greater depth for each of the bible passages he cited. After wrestling for a moment, I think he made the right choice in the touch-and-go methodology in citing Scripture. (Because the more reformed would probably not even pick up a book by a Jesus Culture pastor in the first place!) As I reflect on what this main lines of propositions Banning attempted to convey, I am reminded of James Bryan Smith's Good and Beautiful trilogy. This book (Rooted) would serve as a superb appetitiser (should a small group or church leader decide to ease the flock to journey together with the Good and Beautiful series).

Banning is revealing in his writing of this book, writing at one point that, "Maybe it's because my top love language is words of affirmation, but it kind of irritated me when Jesus said, 'Does he thank that servant because he did the things that were commanded him?'" (pg. 148) Notice how Banning admitted he was irritated with the words of Jesus? Most would be ashamed to admit that they were irritated with Jesus, but Banning admits it anyways. It makes his story easier to relate to, more real.

Throughout this book, we read personal examples from Banning's own life that contribute to what he's trying to tell us. Instead of expecting us to read what would amount to little more than a Christian textbook, Banning explains in a simple, understandable way. The simplicity is not so much as to be insulting, but just enough that it can contribute to the newly-saved's walk with Christ, or to someone who has been saved for a long time.

Banning included many Biblical references; nearly every page has at least one reference. I really appreciated that, because then I could read the passage for myself if I had any questions about his interpretation.

The only thing I did not like about this book was that when Banning references the Bible, he tends to use several translations; you could read three different references and each would be a different translation. It would be better if Banning stuck with one translation – switching translations each time says to me that he's looking for the verse to say what he wants it to say, rather than a more direct (trustworthy) translation that may not say it the way he wants.

I would recommend this book to anyone who is interested in encouragement in their walk with Christ. There were several instances where I personally found encouragement reading this. In one section, God used this book to speak to me about something I had been praying about and give me assurance about His will. I think there's something written in here for every Christian – or even for someone considering Christianity.

This was my first experience with Banning's ministry and I didn't leave disappointed. Reading this spoke to many of the things that I feel on a regular basis in my walk with God and the direction that He is leading my life. The deeper I got into the book, the more I wanted to know because it was all resonating with me. I am currently in the rooting process with God, and in a sense I suppose we always will be, but this book was a perfectly timed read.

"The only way (God) can build this root system of abiding connection is by taking us through a process that asks again and again "Do you trust me?" Every time we say, "I trust you," our root system grows. That's how we thrive as he prepares us to bear lasting fruit." ~Banning Liebscher

For me, this quote was the heart of the book "Rooted." The image of roots, stretching out underground, hidden from all eyes, feeding and anchoring the luxurious upper growth, is a fine one to help us think about the Christian life. We need those roots, often developed in secret, before we can have the visible foliage and desirable fruit.

This book is Banning's meditations on getting roots. He believes that our roots grow best in three "soils," the soil of intimacy, the soil of service, and the soil of community. This means that our relationships matter, and our work matters. To state the obvious- what we do and how we do it shapes our souls.

Banning will do a better job explaining his key concepts and lessons than I will, so let's say this- if you're interested in some accessible thoughts about how a life-vision develops and grows, then try this book. You'll pick up some wisdom, and be reminded that inner growth is what fuels all great actions, and that every risk you take to love somebody and live faithfully is worth it.

This was freeing for me because of how much I travel. Even if I have created the habit and sacred space in my own home, I need to also be able to find this space anywhere that I am.

Rooted focuses on finding your way as God continues to develop the vision he has given you and how to grow deep roots in God.

That's another huge piece of the puzzle for us. One thing Eric said to me as we started this blog was that it was all about roots going deep. This book serves as a road map to help you find that place with God, and trust the process that may have a different timeline than your own.

While I may know the direction my life is headed, I cannot fulfill that calling and vision, without building those roots down deep in the soil of intimacy, serving and community. Rooted helped me think about where I am on this journey in developing my roots so that I can continue to flourish and grow into the vision that God has given me.

As for Banning's writing style it's is crisp and to the point, but what kicks it out of the park is his revelation of scripture and illustrations. He opens with several chapters that bring you into 3 sections; Soil 1: Intimacy, Soil 2: Serving, Soil 3: Community. He makes it clear that we need to cultivate those 3 soils in our life if we want to be rooted and have fruit that will last.
