Webster's dictionary defines hopeful as exciting hope; promising advantage or success and in her latest series, Return to Sugarcreek, Shelley Shephard Gray does just that for two remarkable characters in her book Hopeful. Miriam Zehr wants to have hope. Being twenty-five among the Amish and without any romantic aspects in her future, she is considered a bit of an outcast by both friends and her family. That make Miriam all the more subconscious about being a little overweight and not the prettiest young woman in her opinion. In fact, no one has ever given Miriam a passing glance. She finds solace in working as a waitress and baker at the Sugarcreek Inn, but even there she comes up short, she can't even make it to work on time. It's a good thing she is such a great baker and hard worker or she would have lost her job awhile ago. But something has to change for her.

When Junior Beiler arrives at the Inn and asks to meet with Miriam at her house after work, she finally feels that God is about to answer her prayers. She thinks Junior has come to court her! She has had her eye on Junior for quite some time and is finally willing to believe something good is coming her way. Even her parents are thrilled to hear that Junior is making plans to come to the house to talk to Miriam, However, when Junior arrives all he wants to know is if Miriam can help set him up with her best friend Mary Kate. In one instant, all her hopes and dreams are dashed in pieces. Yet Miriam will never let anyone know that she set herself up believing for one minute that Junior was interested in her and plays it off in front of her parents and Junior. To Junior, she is willing to be that "friend" he needs to get to Mary Kate, but she can't let her parents and family think that Junior doesn't want to court her, so she begins to live a double life of sorts, not being honest to anyone but most of all not even herself.

Judith Graber has learned after her last miscarriage that she can no longer have any babies and she wonders

just what kind of wife can she be to Ben, if she can't give him the family he has wanted. No matter how much Ben assures her that his only concern is for her to get better, no amount of love seems to be enough for Judith to come to terms with only being a wife to Ben and not a mother of his children. She's isn't even willing to consider adoption. Knowing many women who have lost babies, she believes she might find the answer with another doctor, but what if this is the choice God has in store for her, to remain childless. Can she live with that fact forever?

This year might be the year of the Amish genre of my 2014 reading. It's a genre that is a little out of my usual zone and I am still getting the hang of the German language that is incorporated into the story. So far all is going swell!

When I first started this book I had no expectations. (Sometimes that is the best way to go about reading a book.) This book is a fast read. It only has 256 pages, so it's a perfect weekend read or even a perfect in between book. You will be surprised how enjoyable this book is once you get into it. I couldn't believe how much I loved this story and it's characters.

I found myself to really like both the main characters - Miriam and Junior. I couldn't help but relate to Miriam so much when it came to personal attributes. I was first attracted to this book because of the basic premise that closely resembled English courting, which is very different from what I see in the usual Amish fiction. Usually you don't see the boy pursuing the girl as much as Junior goes after Mary Kate. This is what we usually see in much younger people in the English world. This lends a kind of divergence to this book, where the main characters are acting as adults at their jobs or in caring for their families but are very much still juveniles when it comes to courting and relationships. It was sweet to see something in adults that we usually only see in young kids anymore.

I most identified with Miriam in this book. I too was never a skinny girl and always felt left out. I wondered at first why Miriam didn't clarify the situation with her parents, but after reading more I realized that she was probably so tired of feeling like she had disappointed them. This is even more apparent when she finds herself helping Junior's youngest sister and relishing the whirlwind that the larger family constantly lives in.

I was interested to see the topic lean towards obsession and stalking, something that probably is not talked much about in the Amish world. While I am not pleased to see the real world problems intruding in their lives, I'm glad that Gray has included aspects of our "fancy" lives that could definitely take place in the "plain" world.

I'd thought I was burned out on Amish stories, but this book was an enjoyable read. I found myself liking the two main characters--Miriam and Junior--in spite of their flaws. Miriam had a likable personality and sweet innocence that reminded me of a few people I've known in real life. Though Junior had a habit of being somewhat insensitive, he did not come across as a bad person.

I think most romance readers will infer who ends up with who at the end of this book, but skip over the next paragraph if you don't want even the hint of a spoiler. :)

Not only was this story strong in that the main characters had obvious flaws--physical and otherwise--and yet were likable, the the hero also chased the wrong girl for almost the entire book. I love that the author was able to pull this off, leave us with a satisfying ending, and still keep it believable.

There was one thing I didn't like: (And actually, readers of the Seasons of Sugarcreek series--which I have not read--might actually enjoy it.) A subplot is thrown in involving a couple named Judith and Ben. Their story has nothing to do with the characters or main plot of the novel, which I found distracting. Every time I got to those parts, I found myself reading a little faster to get through them. As I said, I may have felt differently if I'd been familiar with the characters.

My thoughts as a writer:

Not too long ago I read an article about creating situations where your character makes a bad decision (which adds conflict to the story, something a book definitely needs) and yet retains readers' sympathy. For instance, if a character does something crazy, instead of the readers rolling their eyes and thinking, 'What a moron,'

you want them to think, 'I might do the same thing in that situation--or I at least understand why he did that.'

The author does a great job implementing this concept on page 35. Miriam lets her parents think something that isn't true. The reader knows this is a bad choice, yet can say they might do the same thing in the same situation. This allows for an extra layer of conflict without losing the trust or admiration of the reader.

Another thing I've seen discussed lately is putting conflict--even if only small doses--in every scene of the book. In this book, I noticed a few scenes where Miriam's boss gives her gentle reprimands that don't have long-lasting implications in the story. They do, however, make the scenes stronger.

Junior (Albert) Beiler, oldest brother of eight children and the head of the house since the death of their parents; he is responsible, hard working, and loyal to his family and friends. He has worked hard to keep the family together, not allowing various extended family members to divide the eight of them up.
