Beneath the story of Melody, who wants to fly so desperately she is summoned to the land of Chimeroan to earn her wings, there is a backstory of a child seeking to escape unbearable pain and guilt. In Up in the Air author Ann Marie Meyers paints a vivid world populated by such creatures as giants, elves, dragons, witches, leprechauns, snakes, wolves, and evil hoarders called Jibber Jabbers. This fascinating world of Chimeroan also spans forests, oceans, deserts, hills and canyons.

In this new environment Melody is faced with new challenges as she embarks on a puzzling and dangerous treasure hunt, and she finally realizes she can't solve the mystery alone. Though Melody yearns to fly away from her regular life, where she feels responsible for a family tragedy, in the unpredictable world of wings she must face new fears as well as old ones. In the process she learns to question what she's always thought of others, as well as herself.

Graced with scenes from classic fairytales, Ann Marie Meyers' Up in the Air is a charming, imaginative read for all ages. Loaded with rich sensory images, quirky characters and unpredictable plot twists, in Up in the Air, Melody learns she cannot escape the pain of either world. In the end, it's about learning compassion, empathy, friendship and trust, attributes she hasn't allowed herself to develop in her earthly life. Disclaimer: The e-book version of this book was sent to me in exchange for an honest review.

I have to admit that in the beginning I wasn't too into it. The tone of the book is way too mature for a children's book and it put me off for a moment, but afterwards the story finds its voice.

Not necessarily my type of children's book - neither now as an adult, nor when I was a kid, but there is enough to keep one entertained. Knowing myself, as a kid I wouldn't have been satisfied and would have loved to learn more about the magical land of Chimeroan where dreams come true and kids learn to fly or become dragons.

I did want more of the characters - for a children's book (especially middle age), story is important, but so are characters and getting a good idea about other persons, not just the lead. For such a complex story I was have expected more on the character development side.

But in the end, the themes in Up in the Air are important and they are presented in a simple, yet quite effective work. Personally, I would have preferred the ending to focus more on teaching the lesson that we have more important wishes and dreams than the childish ones and use that as an opportunity that even if not all dreams come true, it is not the end of the world. But, alas, some can have their cake and eat it. Despite my previous complaint, Up in the Air does offer a good lesson about forgiveness - especially forgiving yourself.

10-year-old Melody wants to fly, to soar like an eagle far above the troubles in her earth-bound life. She knows if she can just swing high enough her wings will unfurl and she'll finally be happy. Until then there's always her patented zombie face guaranteed to frighten away the most tenacious bully or possible friend, keeping Melody safe in her self-imposed cocoon of isolation. When Melody leaps off a swing and into the mystical realm of Chimeroan where dreams come true, she begins a journey to not only earn her wings, but to face her past, conquer her fears, and to discover that the things that hold us back—even the things we want most desperately or fear with all our heart—are not always what they seem.

Up in the Air by Ann Marie Meyers is one of those rare books for children that accurately portrays the reality of being a child without making adults look like stumbling idiots or children seem uber-smart, successful, lucky, or treacle-y sweet versions of grown-ups. On the surface Melody's story is an adventure quest complete with magical beasts, puzzles, and inscrutable Guides. It's easy to get caught up in the world of unicorns, elves, dragons, and leprechauns as most middle grade readers will. But Melody's story is much deeper, a parable for all ages that explores the complicated reasons for self-abusive behavior and a hit-first-before-they-hurt-you view of the world. As Melody progresses in her quest, she has to face and understand

how her perceptions of herself and past events are limiting herself and preventing those she loves from true happiness.

Like flying, it's a view that will leave you breathless.

First, it should be noted that I was granted an Advance Reading Copy of Up in the Air for reasons that do not include my currently being a child, a parent, a teacher, or any other form of expert on current children's literature ("current" meaning more recent than Beverly Cleary and "children's" meaning for a younger audience than J.K. Rowling). What follows is the humble impression of a YA Horror/Sci-Fi author who has been a bookish child in the less distant past than some people.

The Basics:

Like many ten-year-olds, Melody dreams of being able to fly. Like (hopefully) fewer ten-year-olds, she also dreams of undoing the car accident that crippled her father. When an extra long flying jump off the park swings sends her to Chimeroan, where dreams come true, she's given a pair of wings, but in order to keep them, she'll have to solve three riddles, which will require her to trust herself and other people, and play by the game's rules, which may conflict with her plan to use Chimeroan's magic to make her second dream come true as well.

The Downside:

The characters are a little less colorful than they could be in a children's fantasy book. Of course, the story itself isn't a lighthearted adventure; it's about a kid dealing with serious survivor's guilt. That's no downside at all to a disturbingly desensitized grownup like me, but if lighthearted is what you're looking for, or if you're shopping on behalf of a kid who still gets nightmares from Roald Dahl (and who hasn't had at least one of those), be aware, Up in the Air has some very serious moments and some pretty graphic car accident flashbacks.

The Upside:

It's a beautiful exploration of serious grief, guilt, and healing for a young audience. The simplified, didactic dialogue common in children's literature is present, but it doesn't feel forced, given the therapeutic role of the Chimeroan guides, and it never diminishes the depth of the subject matter. Chimeroan itself is a vivid and appropriately dreamlike manifestation of the mind, and Melody's journey to accept herself and mend her relationship with her family is perfectly, tear-jerkingly relatable at any age.
