4 ½ stars. Fun, enjoyable romance. I was chuckling several times. Characters and plot worked well. Nothing annoyed me.

STORY BRIEF:

Emily is a health center massage therapist who is in town for her cousin's wedding. Her relatives take advantage of her by asking her to run errands, do wedding chores, etc. She's staying in a hotel to avoid the additional stress of staying with family members. Jonah is a detective who plays in an ice hockey league for guys over 30. He's in town for several days for a hockey tournament. The hotel is overbooked and puts them in the same room – a room they don't rent out due to a leaky roof and buckets catching water when it rains. Neither wants to leave the hotel which means they have to share the room. Jonah promises he won't make a pass at her, so they agree to share. Meanwhile, Emily's relatives are playing matchmaker for Emily with her repulsive orthodontist third cousin Buddy. When Leanne (the bride) calls the room, Jonah answers the phone. Leanne wants to know who the male voice is, so Emily lies saying he's her boyfriend. As events unfold, he plays along with it.

REVIEWER'S OPINION:

The main story was what I expect from a good romance novel. The only downside might be its short length - 206 pages. Most novels are over 300 pages.

There is a second story that was neat as well. Kirsten was bright with great possibilities in marketing and public relations, but she gave up on herself. She now works as a waitress and dates a loser. She meets Sadhu, one of Jonah's fellow hockey players, with some interesting results – different from what I expected.

I'm finding that the more I like a book, the quicker I gobble it up. Seems like an obvious cause/effect, but it really hit home when I finished Power Play in THREE HOURS!

The only things that stood out more than the steamy bedroom scenes were the unexpected and hilarious

laugh-til-you-cry scenes. It's been a while since I've literally laughed out loud when reading a book and there were multiple moments where I not only smiled and giggled, but I bellowed out full-on laughs during this book.

Good-girl Emily returns to her hometown as a bridesmaid in her cousin's wedding. Since she's single, she always been labeled the 'reliable one,' and constantly bends over backward for her family's requests. Dependable as she may be, Emily refuses to bunk at home and books a hotel room (far away from her family) for the week. As luck would have it, the hotel experiences a bedbug infestation the first night during her stay and she is booted from her room.

Jonah is staying across the hall from Emily when the infestation occurs and the evacuation definitely throws a wrench into his week-long hockey tournament. Because of a hotel mix-up -- and because they're both stubborn -- Jonah and Emily become roommates for the week. There is one up side to Emily's new roommate, however -- an excuse to get her family off her back, as she pretends Jonah is her boyfriend. The sheets sizzle between these two and their banter is absolutely hilarious!

Emily is quick-witted and multifaceted, enjoying a cold beer as much as painting her nails, while Jonah is as big (in a sexy, hover-over-you kind of way) and lovable as a teddy bear. The author also adds a secondary romance to the mix which at first seems confusing, but soon becomes a charming touch that adds another dimension to the story. Rounding things out is a climax with an unexpected clinch, and in the end I was left with a chuckling grin on my face.

This book didn't seem to know whether it was romantic suspense or plain romance. The romantic suspense storyline was kind of a fail and added nothing to the story. This was a cute little romance between a massage therapist (Emily) who's come home to tiny Elk Crossing, Idaho for her cousin's big family wedding, and a cop (Jonah) who's entered a hockey tournament in the same

town. Through a series of somewhat unbelievable and often humorous circumstances (bedbugs!), they end up having to share the same hotel room. I know it all sounds a bit predictable, because you *know* what's bound to happen when you put two single, attractive people in the same hotel room in a romance novel...But, strangely enough, they waited a few days and actually got to know one another a bit before they followed up on the attraction. And also strangely enough, there was no big "massage" seduction scene. Not that I would've minded that...The hero, Jonah, was a stand-up, stick-to-his-word kind of guy, and he promised Emily that he wouldn't make any moves on her when they agreed they'd share a hotel room. So it was kind of cute (and hot) when Emily had to make the first move on the big, virile cop.

The author does a fair job of providing some background info on the two leads, going into detail about Emily's career and why she has trouble just saying "no" to all her extended family's demands (she's a bit of a doormat when it comes to them), and her feelings about love and marriage. I could have used a bit more info about Jonah, besides the fact that he was a detective in Portland, played hockey in a men's over-30 league, and was very hairy (but no back hair!), had to shave more than once a day, had abs of steel, and had similar ideas about marriage. Not much to go on, but I did like how he treated Emily, and while their love scenes were hot, I've read even hotter ones in some recent Blazes. And while they only knew each other for a week, I did like how the author built the relationship--neither was blurting out any "I love yous" (even though they were thinking it)--when the week was up, you knew they weren't quite ready to run off and get married. Score one for believability.

There were a couple of side plots about a friend of Emily's and a firefighter friend of Jonah's hooking up, and a distant relative of Emily's who was up to no good. The relative-gone-bad subplot added a bit of unexpected suspense near the end of the story (where Emily finally learned to just-say NO), and helped the H/H realize just how much the other meaned to them.

So, not a bad escapist read. I wasn't totally wowed, but it was certainly good enough to hold my interest and entertain me. A solid 3 1/2+ stars.

Emily is in Elk Crossing, Idaho, her home town, as a bridesmaid for her cousin's wedding. Jonah, a Portland cop, is in Elk Crossing to participate in the Over-Thirties-Hockey Tournament

A case of bed bugs and absolutely no vacancies thanks to the hockey tournament, forces them to share the last room available in the Elk Crossing Lodge. And an unfortunate incident of the wrong person answering the phone, now Emily's family think her forced roomie is her boyfriend.

Up to the second half of the eighteenth chapter (out of 21), this was a fun, sweet, sassy, and sexy little Blaze story. The beginning with the bedbug infestation was hilarious, and the forced roommate business predicted major chemistry and sparkage. And it delivered. Boy, did it ever.

Both Jonah and Emily were great characters, and even greater when they interacted with each other. The forced proximity quickly "matured" their relationship from reluctant friendship, through all the stages of dating (thanks to a thunderstorm that didn't let them sleep, so they talked through the night), to end up in explosive sexual chemistry, complete with dress-up fantasies involving champagne, strawberries, and a blindfold.

Then, in the second part of the 18th chapter, the sexy, sweet, sassy story took a plunge into a ridiculous suspense subplot that had neither head not tail, but was used more as a cheap parlor trick to make the hero and heroine realize the truth about their feelings.

Also, the side love story involving a secondary-character (a page-count increaser already seen—and severely disliked—in SEALed and Delivered) was completely unnecessary. The author could've used those pages to devise a good and plausible reason for the H/h to "get the epiphany" without the stupid suspense subplot.

Still, the first 17 and a half chapters were amazing enough to earn this one 4 stars.
