

When I saw this cover (dark and all meaningful), and read the premise (death threats from a mysterious person), I knew I had to have this book. I really enjoyed reading it. It had a nice mystery/suspense factor that kept the story going until the very end.

The romance was a bit weird, but taking in account everything that happened, the characters' personalities and everything else, I think that it's believable.

Writing style:

Good, intriguing, makes the reader turn the page and ask for more. Only downside is the need for a final proofreading.

Story line:

After Rebecca receives several text threats, it's like all hell breaks loose. She has to help clear the name of her best friend, Ryan, and in the mean time she meets lots of people, including some enemies she never thought she had.

Characters:

Rebecca(Beck) - being the only witness to a monstrous crime, Rebecca has nightmares since she was 11. The entire town hates her for blaming and sending to jail a 'good' guy. Even she begins to doubt herself until those text threats find her inbox. Then, after Ryan is framed for a school bombing, she decides to clear his name.

I could not believe how brave and resourceful Rebecca turned out to be. I didn't expect it from her, but it really did fit her character.

What I didn't like about her was how her mind strayed to other guys, when she was obviously in love with Ryan. True, she didn't believe there was a future for her and Ryan, but still.

Ryan seemed to be a bit of a wuss, letting/making Beck do everything on her own. Sure, he was wanted by the FBI for terrorism, and his face was everywhere, but I felt like he should've been more involved somehow. The ending put him in a different light. I liked how courageous he was in the spurt of the moment, and how protective he was of Beck.

Andrew was a cop, a friend of Rebecca's and had additional involvement that we weren't told until the end. I had expected a revelation of some sort about his reasons to hang around Rebecca so much, but what I got was not what I'd had in mind. I never believed him to be a traitor though. He was way too straight forward

and predictable.

Jordan - I was glad Beck met him. He was a good friend, taken the circumstances. At one point of time I wished he'd become something more, since I wasn't sure Ryan was good enough for Rebecca. But then I was glad it didn't happen.

I really liked that he had style, without being gay.

Wade - now that guy was a total psycho. His reasons for helping out in the revenge of Mary Kay over Rebecca were ridiculous. I'm sure that without his help Mary Kay wouldn't have had the guts to do anything in the first place. He gave her strength to proceed, ideas and misplaced courage. He didn't feed her need for revenge, but he didn't do anything to stop her either.

All in all, Before They Find Us is a nice mystery/thriller/suspense novel. It isn't perfect, but it's quite enjoyable.

Rebecca Hales, a high school senior, thinks it's a wrong number, a joke. When a bomb goes off in her best friend's locker, she's not laughing anymore. Her friend, Ryan, is unhurt, but now he's suspected of being a terrorist. And when he runs to Rebecca, so do the FBI.

Coincidence? Or something deeper, darker? Could it be possible that its connected to a crime that Rebecca witnessed a few years before?

This is a Teens / YA mystery, a genre I seldom read. However, after a slow start, I found myself not thinking of the protagonists as teenagers. Rebecca and Ryan are finely drawn. The suspense doesn't come in spurts .. its more like a steady flow with a ripple here and there, taking the reader in new directions.

I liked the loyalty that is shown between the two main characters... that Rebecca travels across two states to help her friend find the person or persons responsible. Little do they know the more clues they find, the more they place themselves in mortal danger.

Before They Find Us starts with a prologue from a character that finds it's way into the story later. However you wouldn't know who the character is unless you're at least 60% into the story. This was pretty damn amazing. Really.

Then comes Rebecca (Beck) Hale. I think Beck is one of the rare characters whom I could really see as a real person. I couldn't find one thing in the entire novel that lacked a sense of reality—at least when it came to what Beck did. She's loyal, she's fierce and she's a fighter. And she's one of the girls who are "Girls-with-balls" (Refer to the tags of this post).

Rebecca was a mere eleven when she witnesses the rape and murder of a young girl. She testified against the killer, Kyle, who ended up killing himself in prison on being convicted.

Six years later, Kyle is back for revenge. Or is he?

I would say the first 20% of the book is slow. Ryan—Beck's best friend / love interest—has run from his house in Las Vegas and come to Beck in Wyoming because he's become a target for a bombing conspiracy he had no part in. And both of they are receiving death threat texts. So they run to Las Vegas.

I'm not quite sure I understand the logic of going back where you're in the danger of being arrested, but okay. Hansen made it work. On we go.

Jordan—whose girlfriend gets seriously injured in the bombing that is apparently Ryan's doing—meets Beck in Las Vegas. Convinced of her non-involvement, he agrees to help her find the real bomber.

Jordan and Beck had an amazing chemistry. I absolutely LOVED them together and I was honestly sad to see Beck with Ryan. Sure, they've got the whole I've-known-you-since-you-were-in-diapers thing going on for them but still. While Ryan is the gentle, loving type, Jordan is fierce and goes right to the kill. I like that in my men. Jordan and Beck kiss all of once and it is everything!

His hand slid around my waist, pulling my hips against him. There was nothing tentative about Jordan Bainfield's kiss. No testing the water. No slow build-up. He just threw open the door to lust and dared me to step inside. And I did. For a moment in that hot, spontaneous kiss, but Ryan's face flashed across my mind. This betrayal would cut him so deep. I couldn't hurt him like that.

This explains exactly what I want to say. Throughout the book, wherever Jordan and Beck where involved, I got the feeling that Beck held back only because she felt like it would have been betraying Ryan. She loves him, true, but it just felt like she didn't pursue this thing with Jordan because she felt an obligation to Ryan. Like I said, Jordan and Beck had amazing chemistry and they would have been real good together. *sigh*

I'd rather refrain from talking about Wade because talking about him is basically running the whole damn thing for you. The only thing I could say is that he's got personality. He's the bad guy and he does it so, so well.

The most important thing that Miss Hansen has going for her is the strength of her characters. The first thing that came to my mind when I finished the book and actually sat down to review it is that each character in Before They Find Us has a personality. These days, most YA novels lack that. The character is pleasant to read, sure, but lacks a voice, if you get what I'm saying. But Beck, Ryan, Jordan and Wade have strong personalities with their fixed demeanors and ways of reacting to certain situations. So much so, that they were almost predictable.

I really enjoyed this book. Aside from one or two things here and there that bothered me, it was an excellent read.

The characters in this book were really interesting. I loved Rebecca. She was kickass heroine who knew how to shoot a gun, but also knew that she wasn't immortal. She was confident, but she wasn't confident. She understood and faced fear, but she never buckled against it. Her dynamic character brought a lot to this book and really made the novel feel real. It was interesting seeing the other characters ready to pledge their loyalty to her. She may be gutsy, but she was damn smart (for the most part). Ryan, on the other hand, actually didn't show up as much as I thought he would. While some may think this reflect badly on the book, I mean who wants a book with no leading man, I liked the balance it gave the book. Whatever romance there was between her and other characters, it never took away from the plot and I appreciated that, 'cause I REALLY wanted to find out what happened.

Getting into the two things that bugged me a little: I thought her name was Mary for a good chunk of the first chapter. Then realized that it wasn't when I read the name Beck and was like what?? and then figured out her name was Rebecca (yeah, I couldn't remember what the synopsis said...). Second, one or two typos left me a little confused, or maybe they weren't typos and I didn't get them? But there was an "inside" joke or explanation here and there that didn't make TOTAL sense to me. Maybe I missed something, but that was another thing that came to my attention. Honestly, it happened like twice, but I just got a little lost.

Moving past that, the plot was well constructed. There were hints here and there, but the way that they layered up, creating a puzzle, piece by piece, really kept me interested in the book. Sure, the twists weren't that twisty, but the connections made were really well done. In the end, all the strings were tied together. I also really liked how in depth she was able to get with the characters, fully immersing us in their personalities and backgrounds, without overwhelming readers with information. It helped keep the pace of the plot and gave us a good look at the characters, fully developing them. Hansen also went in depth with the computer programming and spyware material, which I found interesting (and a tad freaky), as it really made it seem like these characters knew what they were talking about. She didn't just label them hackers, she zoomed in closer, explaining how things worked, and how technology, honestly, wasn't as private as we'd like to think it was. It added to the whole thriller factor, but also gives readers some perspective when it comes to technology.

In addition, I loved the iPhone text pictures. They helped pause the plot for a second at a time, as well as added to the plot, while providing comic relief. I liked that they were added to the book, and they really helped put a semi-visual aspect in the book.

I really enjoyed Before They Find Us. While I wasn't always left guessing, the fact that certain details made me wary of characters was a interesting way of keeping me on my toes. This book was well written and I loved the characters and story. Overall, this was a great book, and I would definitely recommend you give it a shot. They were in the parking lot of an IHOP "Mary,' he said when he saw her. She nodded, & he held out his arms.

In the locker room of the high school Becca was working with a member of the football team: "Drake Yancey hopped onto the table next to Brandon. He kicked off his shoes. Drake had the hairiest feet I'd ever seen. The guys called him Sasquatch."

Becca's phone buzzed with a text. "'It's a death threat', Drake said. 'And, you know, it's Rebecca.'

"Before They Find Us" by Michelle A. Hansen was one of those books that I literally could not put down. It was such a page turner that I was up until two in the morning because I was determined to finish it and see the end of Rebecca and Ryan's journey before I went to bed.

The book starts off with a Prologue that seems out of place, until you realize who the characters were and what they were planning. Starting the book this way shows the reader that there is an elaborate plan about to go down, and our main characters are going to be at the heart of it. We are clued in right away to the fact that this is going to be a book with some twists and turns that will leave us at the edge of our seat.

I really enjoyed the main character, Rebecca. The main story was told in her point of view, and Hansen did a great job of making a well rounded character out of her. She has suffered from nightmares since she witnessed something traumatic when she was younger (and is still living with some of the repercussions), but that doesn't turn her into a complete basket case.

She still lives her life, has her best friend, and has the perfect amount of sarcasm to balance out her personality. However, she lives in a small town where she is constantly reminded of that past event, and it makes her a bit of an outcast with some of the people in town.

Speaking of her best friend, his name is Ryan and they grew up with each other before him and his family moved to Las Vegas.Helping Ryan out of some trouble that he's put into is Rebecca's driving force in this story. These two were super cute. You could see how their friendship grows and changes over time, and you can also feel how much they truly care about each other. It was good to see a young adult relationship that was built on years of knowing each other, instead of the instant love that's mostly prevalent lately.

Both of them take their journey to Las Vegas (which I was excited to read about since it's one of my favorite cities!) to get to the bottom of who is trying to frame Ryan and Rebecca gets to know the people he goes to school with. For the first time, she's meeting and hanging out with people who don't know her entire life history and she definitely seems to branch out more.

While in Vegas, Rebecca also meets Jordan, who helps her on her quest. I loved Jordan. At first the two of them butted heads more often than not, but eventually learned to work together. It's possible that I loved

Jordan so much because he brought out Rebecca's lovely snarky side. At one point, he makes her buy a new dress in order to seduce someone they need information from and when Jordan's uncle remarks on it, Rebecca tells him, "I wasn't upscale enough for the Palo Verde crowd, so Jordan repackaged me." Both of them tease and torment each other, and it's fun to see how they work together.

I definitely recommend "Before They Find Us." The characters were well thought out, as was the story as a whole. All of the different characters were woven together in a way that made sense to the overall story, and that story is one you want to just keep reading until you're finished with the last page.

Her best friend Ryan has always been her rock, but now he's gone, leaving her in Wyoming while he finishes high school in Nevada. But all the distance in the world can't sever their bond. Even when the whole world goes haywire.

One threatening text is easy to write off. A wrong number. A bad joke. A fit of drama on a digital screen. But then there's the second text. And the third. And the creepy guy at the convenience store in the middle of the night. And when halfway across the country, a bomb in Ryan's locker kills several students and puts the the FBI on his trail, two friends find themselves on the run, trying to keep ahead of the cops as they scramble to figure out what's really happening and clear Ryan's name. Every now and then I find a book that plucks me right out of reality and places me in another place, another character's shoes, another life so thoroughly that I forget dinner, forget about what I have to get done at work this week, and just about forget where I am. And to think I almost passed this one up.

When I first saw the cover of *Before They Find Us* on the tour announcement, I scrolled right past it. Shadows in an alley? Looks like a mystery or a crime or some other dark mess I'm not interested in. But then I noticed it a few more times, read the summary, and thought about it some more. It was probably going to be far-fetched and borderline ridiculous. Maybe I'd figure out who the killer was (assuming there was one) within the first couple of chapters and then have to force myself to finish reading it. The characters wouldn't be believable, every plot twist would be predictable, or every stroke of luck would just be a little too convenient. Or maybe I'm just an idiot who doesn't immediately jump at the chance to read something fantastic. Yep, that last one sounds pretty accurate just about now.

It's rare that I enjoy a book so much that I'm still half in that other world hours after reading it, but that's exactly what happened with this one. I fell in love with Beck and Ryan, with their friendship and their easy banter, with their loyalty and love and determination to see each other through hell, no matter what came at them. The detailed scenes, the secondary characters, the fumbling to find answers... It was perfectly plotted and paced, and there was no way I was putting the book down until I'd read through to the last page. Not once was I tempted to skim or skip or just cruise past details. I wanted every single word of it.

I've come across a number of YA novels that are great stories, even though I am not in the target-audience age group for that genre. This one is definitely one of those rare jewels that truly was entertaining and endearing throughout the entire story. Even though the story is written in the main female character Rebecca's P.O.V.(Point of view), you also get a bonus 2nd P.O.V. from a vengeful girl named Mary in the prologue. The journey that this story takes you on still feels very fulfilling in all of the aspects it tries to

cover within this novel. This is all thanks to the likeable characters, the mystery surrounding the main characters and the story that hooks you and never let's go through each chapter.

First you have Rebecca "Becks" Hales who is seventeen years old and lives in a small town in Wyoming with her parents and a cute hunting dog named Bullet. She is a beautiful girl who doesn't really put effort into her looks but still get's crushed on occasionally, nonetheless. She's not your average teenager because she's haunted by a crime she witnessed years earlier in the park across the street and doesn't sleep well at night because of the nightmares that replay in her mind of that night. Thanks to her, the person who committed that horrific crime was caught and sent to prison. Unfortunately, something happens in her present day life, causing a whirlwind of events to flip her life completely upside down.
