


Deadly Melody

I received an Advanced Reader Copy of this book from the publisher and am voluntarily reviewing It. I enjoyed Deadly Melody. I really liked the development of Cat's character. Her absence from her family and constant movement and secret identities stemmed from her desire to not let anyone be hurt. This distancing hurt her family relationships as her sister did not understand her motives and consequently felt like she was abandoning them and feared the hurt she would cause. Family relationships can be difficult even in the best of circumstances not to mention in times of peril. I also liked how they brought the lost Martinelli, Nick, into the story. He balances Cat out by bringing the straightforward legal way of approaching the deadly situation versus Cat's lone wolf approach But as one reads the story one sees that they need both their strength and weaknesses to get through the danger. Deadly Melody follows a young woman on the run from her murderous uncle, as she ventures home to her foster family for a wedding. On the night of the wedding, a teenager is killed. Cat tries to help her younger sister determine the cause of the boy's death and winds up sticking around in town longer than planned--thus, putting herself and her family in danger.

I received this book in a GoodReads giveaway; this in no way affects or biases my review of it. I did not like *Deadly Melody*. From what I can tell, it is the third book in a series. However, both the GoodReads description of the book and the eBook itself do not mention that it is part of a series (I likely would not have entered the giveaway had I known this). EDIT: Now, the GR description does acknowledge that it's #3, thankfully. It did not when I wrote this review. Supposedly, *Deadly Melody* can work both as a stand alone novel and as a part of the greater series. I don't agree with that, though.

This book put a bitter taste in my mouth from the beginning, because the reader is thrown into a very large family dynamic, with only half-descriptions of the other family members. Since the series is centered around the family, there is a lot of background knowledge you don't have when starting out with this book. A great deal of weird things happened to the other family members (kidnappings, investigations, drug issues, etc.), but they are only mentioned in passing, since fans will already know all the details. It made it hard for me to get to know the characters and also required a suspension of disbelief, to a certain extent. It felt like being thrown into book four of *Harry Potter* and being expected to know everyone in the series and believe everything that happened with Voldemort, without any context.

The characterization fell flat for me. I was pretty neutral on Cat, but I couldn't really grasp her personality. She cared about her family, yet I found it difficult to believe she was still in contact with any of them in the first place. She was on the run (and she reminds you of this every single page), so she shouldn't have had much time to speak with them. She also had biological parents and an uncle she lived with, growing up. I was confused about when, in the time span of her life, she had the ability to grow close to the Martinellis family and how she kept up with them while in hiding. She also just didn't have much of a personality. The first 200 pages are spent with her freaking out about her uncle and the possibility of her identity being discovered. The last 150 pages are her freaking out about something in the plot. She's just always anxious. I don't know if she has any other personality traits, to be honest.

The other characters seemed fleshed out, but again, it was difficult for me to figure out their personalities. They seemed like they had been developed in the first two books, and I was expected to already know about them.

The writing is actually what I had the biggest problem with in *Deadly Melody*. It's very simple and juvenile. It felt like a YA book, where things were constantly repeated. Yes, I know Cat was worried about being discovered. But she did not need to repeat it every single page. She also didn't need to reiterate her fascination with Nick every other page. New emotions and thoughts were never introduced-- it was just the same ones recycled over and over. Even when the plot becomes a little more dramatic, it's just more of the same: Cat whining about being upset, yet not really doing a whole lot. She says she'll do things, but more space is spent on her worrying and thinking about doing something than actually doing it.

Also, the author had some weird fascination with eyes. Almost every page she would write something about either Cat or Nick's eyes. Apparently you can tell everyone's emotions and background by looking into their eyes. I'm cool with mentioning eyes here and there, but there were a ridiculous amount of eye descriptions in *Deadly Melody*. Just for reference, the word "eyes" was mentioned 325 times in this book. Teddy, the murdered boy who the plot revolves around, was mentioned 172 times. The book is 339 pages, so eyes are brought up almost every page.

I'm shocked that this book has such a high rating. Maybe it wouldn't be so bad if I'd read the other two first... but, I dunno. The mystery element was predictable; the romance felt forced. I don't see the appeal in this one, and I do not recommend it. If you're going to go against my advice, at least start with book one.

Spine-tingling adventures await with every swipe of the finger or turn of the page in Connie Mann's Deadly Melody. Third in Mann's Safe Harbor series, Deadly Melody can be read as a stand alone book, although it may be a little richer if you have previously read the first two books in the series.

As a young teenage girl, Catharine, an accomplished violinist, runs away from her powerful uncle who is involved in drugs and the mob.

Returning "home" for the wedding of her foster sister in Florida, Cat agrees to her sister's request to provide music. Having once thought herself safely hidden in Safe Harbor, the death of another sister's boyfriend indicates Cat may have been found by those she eluded years ago. To keep her family and friends safe, Cat keeps everyone at a distance. Cat is very independent, loyal, and determined to sacrifice herself for those she loves.

The biological son of Sal and Rosa Martinelli, yet kidnapped and raised by friends of the Martinellis, Nick

Stanton is the town's police officer who falls for Cat. Obviously Cat is either IN trouble or she IS trouble; Nick can't decide which. Should he help Cat or arrest her? Who has it out for her and why?

The rapid pacing of the book,the many twists, and the total lack of trust between characters kept my neck in whiplash mode. I tried to decode who was the guiltiest party, who would outsmart whom, and who would not live to see the light of the next day. Timing is everything in a novel of this genre, and Connie Mann has it down pat. Me, I'm going to practice my deep breathing and panic-fighting techniques so as to be ready for Mann's next novel!

I received an Advanced Reader Copy of this book from the publisher and am voluntarily reviewing it.

This is the first book I've read by Connie Mann but won't be the last. I planned on reading it during my kids' soccer practices, but I ended up reading it during lunch and waking up early to get a few pages in before taking the kids to school. I don't read romantic suspense often, but I do enjoy books by Lisa Harris, who writes Christian romantic suspense. I have also enjoyed many books by Mary Higgins Clarke. Deadly Melody was just as good as any books I've read by those authors, but a little steamier.

Deadly Melody is told from a Christian worldview in which the main characters (the good ones at least) are Christians and frequently turn to God in times of need. The characters, while they do kiss heavily, do not have premarital sex. There are some references to sex, such as in a scene in which a police officer comes upon teenagers making out in a car and when a character stays in a hotel and tries not to listen to the goings on in the room next door. There's no foul language. The book involves sex trafficking and drugs but is not graphic. I would recommend it to teens and up because of the subject matter.

I do not know if there are any books planned to come after Deadly Melody, but there were a couple of side stories that were not cleared up at the end. I would enjoy reading more about Nick's past, for example. However, Deadly Melody has a satisfactory ending and does not have a cliffhanger.

It is part of a series, and while I could tell it was part of a larger story, I was able to enjoy it (a lot!) without having read the other books in the series. I must warn you that after getting to know the other characters in

the book, you might want to read the books that come before it.
