But when the reading starts, it becomes clear that the book is not about children, or, more precisely, not only about children. It's about parents, about psychological evolution of people when they become moms and dads. Daniel Prokop shares some personal stories on how dealing with his own kids has changed his perception of the outward things, that it's very hard to explain socially common things to kids.
